

SNAP-SHOTS AT VARIOUS SPORTS.

Dan McEwen has Texas Rooker right on edge now, and the big bay is traveling very fast. He took a record of 2:06 1-4 yesterday at Syracuse. He ought to get close to 2:03 this season.

The matinee races are over for this season, with the exception of the finals for the trophies. Among this season's "finds" none have shown more improved form than N. McLeod's fine pacer, Walter S. He has gone faster every time out, and would, if taken to the circuits, make good in fast company. He's a wonderfully improved horse since spring. Young McLeod handled him all season.

Gordon Butler, the secretary-treasurer of the Rugby Club, has been transferred from this city to the accountancy of the Merchants' Bank at Chatham. No one has done more for Rugby in this city than Gordon Butler, and no one has given more of his time to boom the game. His place will be hard to fill.

That western mare, The Broncho, 2:02 1-4, again established her claim to queen of pacer race mares at Galesburg by pacing the third heat of her race there in 2:02 1-4. It is really too bad The Broncho was not brought east, for, while it looks as though she would have been able to beat the pacers in the first class on the Grand Circuit tracks, it is also likely that before the circuit followers reached Cincinnati some of the pacing cracks would have developed form to make her place her record below 2:02 1-4. Possibly the Broncho mare may yet get mixed up with the pacers now in the east, in which case it is likely that she will have to give the public a true line on her speed limit.—Horse World.

A bulletin came out some time ago, signed by a physician, stating that Territorial Terry McGovern was again strong mentally and physically. We almost thought so until we read the challenge he had in the papers the other day, in which he declared he would be supremely happy to meet Battling Nelson. Don't do it, Terry. A 200 to 1 shot got home at Gravesend the other day, and we were not aboard. And the worst of it was that the bookies were relieved of their summer's earnings. The New York Giants won a game from Brooklyn the other day by scoring seven runs in one inning on two hits. That's about as bad as that St. Thomas team would do. They are bound to present the rag to McGraw's gang.

But one hit was made off Waddell up to the ninth inning of a recent game in Boston, and both the hits in that inning were of the scratchy order. He struck out eleven men in nine innings, and seventeen in the game, and of these strike-outs, twelve were in the last seven innings. He retired Pitcher Winter five times on strikes, and Burdett three times in succession. The runs made off him in the ninth inning were the first scored off him in 44 innings. "Rube" added this feat of seventeen strike-outs to a long list of achievements this season. He holds the record, fourteen strike-outs in a nine-inning game with the Chicago White Sox. He has struck out thirteen of the Nationals in a game, eleven of the Nationals and Browns, ten of the New Yorks and Detroit, twelve of the Bostonians in the twenty-inning game, twelve of the Browns in a sixteen-inning game, and eleven of the Sox in a fourteen-inning game. In the 43 innings in which his opponents failed to score off him up to the ninth inning Tuesday, but nineteen hits were made off "Rube's" delivery.

Sleever was in great form in the afternoon game and came near equaling the association record of 11 strike-outs in one game. From the way he started out the fans thought he was going to break the record. Hickey, Berger, Kellum and Goodwin are the pitchers who have made 11 strike-outs in one game this year. Last year the association record was 12.—Minneapolis Tribune.

In explanation of the reason why the Canadian horses show such poor summer and fall form, it is due largely to the hard work they do in the early season, especially for the Ontario Jockey Club meets. The trotters and pacers have demonstrated that wintering in our northern climate does not affect the speed of a horse at all—in truth, the horses wintered in the north have simply swept the circuits this year, as shown by the triumphs of Sadie Mac, Katherine L., Maud Kewick, Texas Rooker and others. In picking up a paper the other day it was shown that Maud Kewick was distanced one day in June in 2:20. They take more time to develop the speed of the trotters and pacers, and when the season of the rich stakes is on, they simply take the big share. Our Canadian breeders of the rich stakes is for the spring meet, and as soon as that meet is over, the horses go stale and lose form altogether. Maybe it would not be a bad idea for the trainers of runners to copy the methods of Stinson, James and other teamsters.

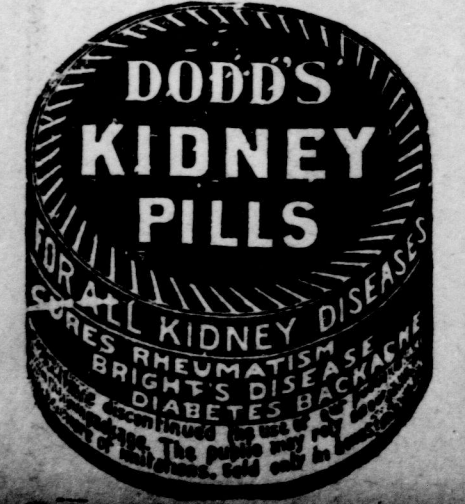
M'EWEN DRIVES TEXAS ROOKER IN A FINE RACE AT SYRACUSE

Won \$1,200 Event in Straight Heats—Geary Not in Money in Empire Stake.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 15.—At the Grand Circuit races held today on the State Fair grounds 20,000 persons witnessed Audobon Boy, in the rain, pace a mile without wind shield in 2:04, in an effort to break the track record of 1:59 1-2.

The first quarter was made in 30 3/4 seconds, the second in 29 3/4, and the third in 29 3/4.

When the time was hung out a mighty cheer swept through the crowd of spectators, although few of them appreciated what the performance really was.



"You have witnessed one of the most remarkable miles ever paced by a horse," shouted Starter Newton, and the cheers were renewed.

Had Audobon Boy been favored by conditions there is little doubt but that the State Fair grounds would have a world's record.

Eight races, bringing together the best horses of the year, gave an indication of what today's sport at the State Fair grounds was like.

Every winning horse lowered or equaled his best previous mark, and three-quarters of the heat winners chopped from one-quarter of a second to three seconds from the records they had when brought to Syracuse.

Of the 22 heats trotted and paced 16 were in 2:10 or better.

The first heat in Texas Rooker stepped the first heat of the 2:11 pace in 2:04 1-4, and Snyder McGregor won the final heat in the eighth race in 2:07 1-4, the finishes and record-breaking miles.

Texas Rooker, the London, Ont., pacer has commenced to show form, and gives every indication of fulfilling the ante-season prediction when it was claimed that he would equal the record of Gallager of last season.

Dan McEwen, the veteran Canadian reinsman, drove a beautiful race, and was warmly applauded at the finish of each heat. Summary:

THIRD BIG LEAGUE POSSIBILITY IN 1906

Louisville, Sept. 15.—If the plans of Manager George Tebeau, W. H. Watkins, of Minneapolis, and two or three other minor league clubs of some prominence do not miscarry, there will be a third big league in 1906, in which one and possibly two of the big league teams are expected to form a part.

The plans, it is said here, have been fomenting for some time, and are what might be called the natural outgrowth of the long and bitter fight made by some of these men against the National Association of Baseball Clubs.

As at present planned, the cities included in the club are Louisville, Columbus, Minneapolis and either Indianapolis, Toledo or Cincinnati in the west, and Baltimore, Washington and Brooklyn in the east, the fourth city not having yet been determined on.

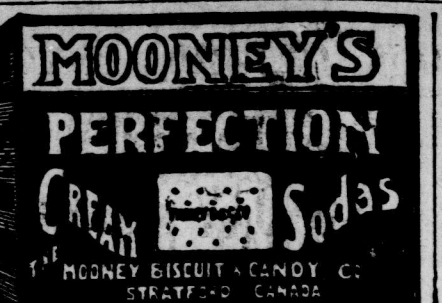
SECOND CHOICE WON HANDICAP.

SEVERAL SUDDEN FATALITIES OCCUR

Two Persons Dropped Dead in Toronto on Friday—Death From Fall.

Toronto, Sept. 16.—Wm. Drew, employed by J. A. McLeary, druggist, dropped dead on Spadina avenue yesterday.

T. H. Woods, insurance broker, dropped dead yesterday.

Albert Brack, aged 22, just out from England, fell from the second-story of the Imperial Hotel, King street, while cleaning windows, and broke his neck. He died at Emergency Hospital a few hours afterwards.

THROWN FROM SKULKY.

Rochester, N. Y., Sept. 16.—Levi Hey, one of the leading business men of Rochester, died yesterday from hemorrhage of the brain. Mr. Hey was thrown from a skulky, and the fall resulted in concussion. Mr. Hey was at the head of a large paper company, and was a noted owner of fast horses.

STRUCK BY FLYER.

Unionville, Sept. 16.—The Peterboro Flyer, on the G. T. R., struck Campbell, who was driving a horse hitched to a wagon at the public crossing here yesterday. Campbell, who was about 20 years of age, was killed instantly, having had his neck, back, both legs and one arm broken. The horse was also killed, and the wagon wrecked. Campbell was a teamster and mail-driver.

MINISTER SUICIDES.

Louisville, Ky., Sept. 16.—After a varied career as a lawyer, minister of the gospel to two denominations, writer of religious works, and chaplain in the army during the Spanish war, Rev. John Bell Rice killed himself with a pistol, because of sufferings from a cancer which had affected him for three years.

DROWNED.

Port Colborne, Sept. 15.—The mysterious disappearance of James Stuart, from Aberdeen, Scotland, in the employ of Messrs. Larkin & Sangsters, contractors, who has been missing since Monday last, was explained yesterday, when his body was found floating in the Welland Canal. It is supposed Stuart committed suicide; he had become despondent of late. He leaves a wife and three children in Scotland.

Death Roll Grows.

Avon, Conn., Sept. 15.—The list of deaths by the explosion and fire which destroyed the Climax fuse works yesterday afternoon, now numbers nine, two of the injured having died during the night. The latter were Charles Dimock, and Miss Nora Ryan. Another of the injured, Charles Leggett, is not expected to live.

BUNCOED OUT OF \$3,000

Old Game Successfully Worked on an Innocent at Ocean Grove.

Asbury Park, N. J., Sept. 16.—Eden Laing, a Railway man, was buncoed out of \$3,000 in Ocean Grove easily. A man who said he was a brother of Senator John Kean, of Elizabeth, enticed him to 77 Mount Carmel way. There he was introduced to "Mr. Weden," a book agent, who showed Laing a table covered with black cloth on which there were cards.

Weden said he had originated a new game, and invited his visitors to try it. "Kean" drew a card and won \$17, which the book agent gave him. Finally he insisted that Laing invest \$1, and the old man consented.

"Goodness!" exclaimed Weden, "there is a star on the bottom of that card and you win \$2,000."

Weden, however, refused to pay the prize until Laing showed him the money, so that he would have a fair chance to get back his money. Laing drew \$3,000 from the bank, and Weden apparently put the money in a box and gave it to Laing. When the box was opened later it was found that it was filled with old paper and junk. City Detective Walsh was detailed on the case, but the gold-brick men had several hours' start and there is no clue to their whereabouts.

KISSED BY EXPRESS
