TRUSTEE CANNOT VOTE FOR HIMSELF

Such Is City Solicitor's Opinion
in Case of Mr. Manigault—
No Librarian Yet.

The library board met last night,
and once again failed to select a
librarian. City Solicitor Meredith gave
his written opinion to the effect that
Trustee Manigault cannot vote for
himself for librarian, as it would be
contrary to public policy. However,
Mr. Meredith stated that there are no
written authorities to be followed on
the subject.

As a consequence, the board post-
poned the appointment until May 11.
Another application for the position
was received from Mr. Samuel T. Cook,
of South London.

Trustee Hamilton gave notice of
motion to increase the salary of Miss
Gray, Miss McLaughlin and Miss
Leigh.

Trustee Macklin proposed that the
new librarian, whoever he might be,
should be compelled to take a course
in a library training institute, but the
suggestion did not meet with the favor
of the board.

The acting librarian's report was as
follows:

Circulation for four weeks ending
April 28: Fiction 3,038, juveniles 863,
miscellaneous 1,420, magazines 562, to-
tal 5,883; average circulation of books
per day 219, average circulation of
magazines per day 23, receipts \$33.87,
average fines per day 90 cents, cards
issued 142, cards issued to date 12,993.

Chairman Hazard, Trustees Labelle,
Hamilton, Bland, Manigault, Murphy,
Macklin, Dr. Jeffrey and Mayor Judd
were present.

Joe Not Downcast.

London, May 3. — A meeting of the
tariff commission was held today.
Mr. Chamberlain presiding. He con-
gratulated the commission on the work
accomplished, avowed that the general
election did not turn on the prefer-
ence, and expressed absolute confidence
in the ultimate success of the move-
ment.

Resolutions were passed providing
for a continuation of the work of the
commission in the greatest activity,
and especially for the completion of
the report on preference, showing the
advantages to Great Britain, and the
line on which, from the side of Great
Britain, the greatest advance can be
made.

WITHOUT SODA OR POP, THANKS

Whisky, With These Touches,
Now 15 Cents a Glass—Other
Drinks Also Advance.

The local Licensed Victuallers' Asso-
ciation held a meeting yesterday after-
noon in the Albion Block, and decided
to increase the prices of drinks, as
follows:

Whisky, with soda or pop, 15 cents a
glass, or two for 25 cents; formerly
10 cents straight.

Barrel whisky, 10 cents a glass, or
three for 25 cents; formerly 5 cents a
glass.

Bottled ale and lager, 15 cents a pint
and 25 cents a quart; formerly 10 cents
a pint and 15 cents a quart.

The following remain at former
prices: Case whiskies, 10 cents; draft
ale, lager and porter and all kinds of
pop, 5 cents.

The liquor merchants have also in-
creased prices. Henceforth bottled
ale and porter, in quarts, will cost 20 cents
a dozen more; pints, 10 cents more.

Ten cents a quart on all barrelled
whisky goods has also been added.

The increase in the prices of liquors
served over the bar will affect the bet-
ter class of trade only, with the ex-
ception that there will be no 6-cent
whisky.

The price of beer by the glass re-
mains the same, and no standard size
of glass was agreed upon.

CITY WILL MAKE PAVEMENT REPAIRS

Decides to Adopt Day Labor Plan
on Asphalt—East End Work
To Be Hurried.

The board of works last night de-
cided to have the repairs to the as-
phalt pavement made by day labor by
the city engineer's department.

The Warren Paving Company has a
contract with the city to do the work,
but the board is of the opinion that
the repairs are costing by far too much
annually.

Ald. Garratt suggested that the
holes be filled in with concrete, but
the city engineer said such repairs
would not last a week, and he and Ald.
Garratt engaged in a wordy war in
regard to the matter.

It was finally agreed to have Mr.
Graydon buy, if possible, the asphalt
necessary for the repairs, if no suit-
able substitute can be secured.

The board instructed the engi-
neer to notify the street railway to
hurry up its work on the Richmond
street pavement and to start to lay its
share of the Dundas street east pave-
ment immediately. The paving com-
pany was set to work in the east
end on account of the railway's delay.

"The street railway is trying to do
100 men's work with twelve men," re-
marked the engineer.

Ald. Garratt moved that the prop-
erty on the southeast corner of Ridout
and Horton street be purchased and
turned into a park at a cost of \$1,000,
as desired by the park commissioner.

The motion was left over. This com-
mittee will visit the spot in question
on Saturday.

A new lawn mower for the city parks
will be purchased from James Cowan
& Co., at \$92.

A sewer will be initiated on York
street between Hurwell and Adelaide.

Half the ratepayers petitioned for the
sewer, but eight names were needed to
have the petition sufficiently signed,
and the board thought it wise to
initiate the sewer.

The board decided to hold its an-
nual inspection of streets on Saturday
next, when the members will leave the
city hall at 1:30 p.m.

RAILWAYS MUST CONNECT LINES

Railway Commission to Have
Power to Make Interswitch-
ing General.

Ottawa, May 3.—The House today
made a number of amendments to Mr.
Emmerson's bill to amend the railway
act, the chief of which gives power to
the railway commission to compel rail-
ways in cities, towns or villages to con-
nect their lines for the purpose of trans-
ferring engines and cars from one rail-
way to another. Even where two lines
do not actually cross they may be com-
pelled to make connection for the pur-
pose of affording facilities to industries
and shippers. The bill now goes to a
special committee, which will deal with
the clauses bringing telephone tolls un-
der the supervision and control of the
railway commission, and Mr. Emmers-
on intimated that he would be willing
for the committee to consider the ques-
tion of including telegraph and express
companies in the provisions of the bill.

Mr. Fisher's bill to amend the fruit
marks act was passed. Several other
Government bills were advanced a stage
and in supply the estimates of the In-
land revenue department were voted.

The House went again into commit-
tee on Mr. Fisher's bill to amend the
fruit marks act. Mr. Piche (St.
Mary's, Montreal), moved an amend-
ment to provide for honest packing of
wild fruit in close packages. He said
many packages sent to Montreal,
which contained leaves and branches.
This should be made unlawful, but he
did not want to provide for the grad-
ing of wild fruit.

Mr. Fisher thought the provision
suggested would be too far-reaching.
He apprehended that the principal
fruit aimed at was blueberries.

Mr. Jos. Girard (Chicoutimi) and
Mr. Piche continued the debate in French.

the former urging that there should be
boxes of regular sizes for blueberries.

Mr. Loeble (Northumberland, N. B.)
said that 200 tons of wild blueberries
went from his county to Maine for
packing purposes each year, and it was
a fact there were altogether too many
leaves shipped with them, but the
remedy lay, he thought, in a special
act regarding wild fruit.

Mr. Piche withdrew his amendment
on the promise of the minister to look
into the matter and endeavor to pro-
vide a remedy for the practice com-
plained of, and the bill was given a
third reading.

Consideration of Mr. Emmerson's bill
to amend the railway act, 1903, was re-
sumed in committee, and in reply to a
question by Mr. W. P. Maclean it was
stated by Mr. Emmerson that he would
be willing for the special committee to
which the clauses giving to the rail-
way commission power to regulate
tolls and the operations of telephone
companies, was referred, to consider
also the question of the regulation of
telegraph and express rates.

Mr. Emmerson proposed to amend
the clause providing a penalty for con-
ductors, engineers, train dispatchers,
telegraph operators, station agents,
switchmen or other persons employed
in connection with the movements of
trains being intoxicated while on duty,
by fixing the punishment at a fine not
exceeding \$50, and imprisonment for
one year, with hard labor.

Mr. Lancaster argued that the pen-
alty should not be confined to those
men, but that higher officials should
also be rendered subject to a penalty.

TEN YEARS FOR AUTHOR

Compiler of Noted Work on Mathe-
matics Guilty of Forgery.

Kansas City, Mo., May 3. — Michael
Angelo McGinnis, a former college
professor and author of a standard
work on mathematics, was convicted
of forgery in the criminal court here
yesterday, and sentenced to ten years
in the penitentiary. McGinnis and a
confederate forged a deed to a city lot
and sold the property for \$800.

While publishing a newspaper in
Newton County, Missouri, McGinnis
was sent to the penitentiary for mis-
use of the mails.

In the penitentiary he wrote the
book which made him famous with
mathematicians throughout the world.
He called it "Algebra, the Universal
Solution for Numerical and Literal
Equations." After his release from
prison the book was published simulta-
neously in America and England.
