Workings of Alleged Combine To Be Laid Before Federal Grand Jury in Chicago Today.

Washington, Jan. 24.-The national Government is going after the so-called meat trust, and is going after it hot and heavy.

Swift, Armour and Morris are the concerns involved, and indictments of them are to be sought before the federal grand jury, which meets next

Monday at Chicago. The charge of the Government against Swift. Armour and Morris is that they have violated the Sherman anti-trust law by maintaining an illegal combination known as the National Packing Company, and thereby tending to create a monopoly and restrain trade.

Indictments are first to be asked for. and later the Government may seek to dissolve the alleged illegal combination as it has proceeded against the Standard Oil Company and the American Tobacco Company.
