HYDRO REPAIR SHOPS TO BE BUILT HERE

Includes Garage For Automobiles of Inspectors Who Will Work From London.

The hydro-electric repair ships will be built in this city, and in connection with the building there will be a big garage for storing the automobiles of the commission's inspectors, as well as a department for these officers.
