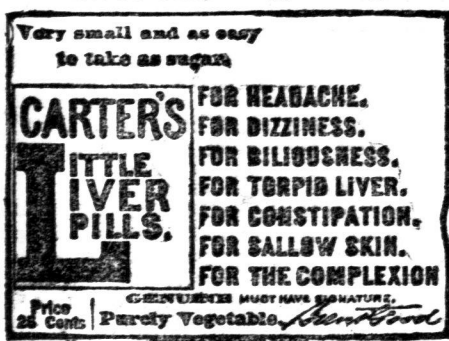

PRINCES' GAY LIFE MUST CEASE NOW

Kaiser to Discipline His Sons and Teach Them Politics.

Berlin, Oct. 18.—Two of the German Emperor's sons, the Crown Prince and Prince Adalbert, are about to start on tours abroad, and both will sail in German battleships.

On Nov. 10 the crown prince leaves Wilhelmshaven for the Far East aboard the armored cruiser Gneisenau.

The tour, it is stated, is being undertaken by the crown prince with the object of broadening his knowledge of some of the problems of far eastern politics.

It is reported that he and the crown princess, who accompanies her husband on his travels, are not so pleased at the prospect before them as they are generally supposed to be. They regard the trip in fact as a sort of penance for the life hitherto too gayly lived. If current gossip may be believed.

Unfit to Succeed.

Some months ago when the Kaiser was suffering with a disabled wrist the newspapers commented upon the apparent unfitness of the crown prince to take his father's place in the conduct of the empire's affairs. The crown prince, so the story goes, realized his limitations, but sought to excuse himself by laying the blame on the manner of his upbringing. He maintained that he had always been rigidly excluded from politics, that he had never been consulted by his father, and that in consequence he had been forced into an idle life in which sport played a large part.

The Kaiser, it is said, suddenly realized his son's shortcomings and decided to adopt another policy by rushing him into political affairs. The crown prince in the past has sought for the opportunity of making himself useful in state affairs. The opportunity having always been denied, he now seems being sent on a voyage which he holds should have been undertaken five or six years ago, and which he interprets as a reproof for his present mode of life.

According to advices received from Peking the Chinese Government intends to bestow upon the crown prince a unique honor by inviting him to reside in the Forbidden City during his stay in Peking. If he decides to be the guest of the Chinese imperial family instead of the German legation he will live in a palace of the late Emperor Kwang Hsu, prettily situated on an island in one of three picturesque lotus lakes within the red walled Forbidden City. The palace stands quite apart from the other palaces and is sacred in ordinary circumstances from intrusion by foreigners or even the highest Chinese dignitaries.

Goes to South America.

While the crown prince travels east Prince Adalbert goes west, his voyage taking him to South America. He will

cross the Atlantic in the new 10,000-ton cruiser battleship Von der Tann, either as navigating or chief ordnance officer. The Von der Tann will sail early in 1911, and she will show the German flag in some of the principal ports of the eastern coast of South America. She may also go round Cape Horn and visit Chile, Bolivia and Peru.

The object of the vessel's great cruise with Prince Adalbert aboard is twofold. It is understood that the cruise is intended not only to raise the commercial and political prestige of Germany throughout Latin America, but to exhibit on the spot a specimen of the battleships which German dockyards are capable of turning out. The vessel is the latest and finest product of German naval skill afloat, and she was built in remarkably quick time, having been laid down in March, 1908, and turned over to the navy in May, 1910.

Prospective customers, it is pointed out, will learn that her builders, Messrs. Blohm & Voss, of Hamburg, offered to deliver the Argentine battleships now building in the United States faster than either the British or their American rivals, namely within 27 to 30 months. The richer South American States are regarded in Berlin as highly desirable customers, and nothing will be spared to make the Von der Tann an alluring sample. She is expected to return to Wilhelmshaven in the autumn of 1911.

Wants To Marry.

It is stated that Prince Adalbert is engaged in a peaceful quarrel with his father and mother on the subject of matrimony. The prince wants to marry, and has chosen for his wife the very youthful daughter of a Thuringian prince, who is said to respond favorably to his suit. But their betrothal is subject to the Kaiser's sanction, and his majesty is again in the match on the grounds that it is undesirable for his son to marry until he gives up active service in the navy.

The Kaiser does not desire Prince Adalbert to leave the navy yet. The imperial idea is always to have one Hohenzollern prince on the active list. Now that Prince Henry has retired, Prince Adalbert must remain in the service until his youngest brother, Prince Joachim, is ready.

To these objections Prince Adalbert replied that he is 26 and 5 years older than his younger brother, Prince August Wilhelm, at the time of the latter's marriage. The Kaiser and Kaiserin both objected also to this marriage as premature, but August Wilhelm had his way, and was married in October, 1908.

114 PATIENTS IN VICTORIA HOSPITAL

Trust Received Supt. Heard's Report Yesterday.

A meeting of Victoria Hospital trust took place yesterday afternoon in the mayor's office at 3 o'clock. In the absence of Mr. J. C. Judd, Trustee Secretary, occupied the chair.

During the month of September, 49 males, 65 females, and 38 children had been admitted to the hospital, while 45 males, 70 females and 21 children had been discharged.

At the end of September there were altogether 114 patients in the hospital.

SERVICE OF PRAISE A GREAT SUCCESS

Splendid Programme Was Rendered by Choir and Soloists of St. Andrew's Church.

MONTREAL CATHOLICS

French-Canadians are both greatly worked up over the bi-lingual question, and it is likely that the Bishop of London has started a controversy which will be continued in Montreal. The Irish Catholic priests are all very strongly in favor of the stand he has taken, but they do not care to say so. "More power to him!" exclaimed one priest in a conversation on Bishop Fallon's visit to Montreal. "But a good luck in his work. But what a full expression of opinion was asked for publication the reverend father should up like a worm, and it was impossible to get a word out of him."

"His lordship is right," remarked another Irish priest, "but I would not dare say so in public. If I did I would receive an invitation to go up to the Archbishop's Palace at once, and I don't know what might happen to me there."

An Outspoken Man.

Rev. Father Donnelly, pastor of St. Anthony's parish, is the only Irish priest in the city who could be prevailed upon to allow his words to be published. He is noted for his independence of stand.

Rev. Father Donnelly thoroughly concurs in the position taken by his lordship.

"Why, of course, I cannot but second Bishop Fallon in the remarks he made at Goderich yesterday, considering that our experience here with bi-lingual schools has shown us that they leave much to be desired. The result of the schooling is that either one of these languages are neglected. In the first place so short is the time allotted for school work that justice cannot be done the pupils in such schools."

"Incidentally his Lordship of London has shown up certain persons who have been indulging in tirades against him on this score. His attitude is clear, and as such should be admitted by everyone at all familiar with conditions prevailing in educational circles as they really are. A thorough grounding in the mother tongue, with a supplementary study of any other language desired, is what is needed, not a system wherein a child is forced to absorb a little of both languages, with but small prospect of retaining much of either."

Can Easily Learn Both.

La Presse, speaking editorially, said last night:

"We regret that we cannot agree with the opinion of Mr. Fallon. French-Canadians are well able to learn both French and English at the same time, provided that they are given the means of doing so. This is proven in the Province of Quebec. No French-Canadian refuses to learn English, because he understands that it is necessary, but no French-Canadian will consent, nevertheless, to abandon French. It is very beautiful to say to the French-Canadians, like Mr. Fallon: 'Have purely French schools if you wish.' But the French-Canadians understand well that their one resource is bi-lingual education."

"It is possible that Bishop Fallon, up to a certain point, is right in saying that the bi-lingual schools in his diocese are not as successful as might be desirable. But to what is this due? The French-Canadians obtain these schools through trouble and misery, and they find all sorts of obstacles in their road. Also, in the Diocese of London it is not with such sympathy as is shown for them by Bishop Fallon that they can prosper. It is for that reason that the Ottawa congress demanded from the Government better protection for the bi-lingual schools."

La Patrie, in a long editorial, said:

"The Bishop of London cites the cases of the schools of a number of French-Canadian parishes which the last examinations, he says, revealed the incapacity of nearly all the scholars. During his tour of inspection he was informed in one parish that the greater part of the boys from 11 to 16 years of age were unable to read."

"These facts may be true. But the conclusion which Mr. Fallon draws from it is altogether false."
