

I consider that our experience here with bi-lingual schools has shown us that they leave much to be desired. The result of the teaching of two languages in the primary schools is that either one or both of these languages are neglected. In the first place so short is the time generally allotted for school work that justice cannot be done the pupils in

"Incidentally his Lordship of London has shown up certain persons who have been indulging in tirades against him on this score. His attitude is clear, and as such should be admitted by everyone at all familiar with conditions prevailing in educational circles as they really are. A thorough grounding in the mother tongue, with a supplementary study of any other language desired, is what is needednot a system wherein a child is forced to absorb a little of both languages, with but small prospect of retaining

Can Easily Learn Both.

"We regret that we cannot agree with the opinion of Mgr. Fallon. French-Canadians are well able to learn both French and English at the same time, provided that they are given the means of doing so. This is proven in the Province of Quebec. No French-Canadian refuses to learn English, because he understands that it is necessary, but no French-Canadian will consent, nevertheess, to abandon French. It is very beautiful to say to the French-Canadians, like Mgr. Fallon: 'Have purely French schools if you wish.' But the French-Canadians understand well that their one resource s bi-lingual education.

"It is possible that Bishop Fallon, up to certain point, is right in saying that the bi-lingual schools in his diocese are ot as successful as might be desirable. But to what is this due? The French-Canadians obtained these schools at great rouble and misery, and they find all sorts of obstacles in their road. Also, in the Diocese of London it is not with such sympathy as is shown for them by Bishop Fallon that they can prosper. It is for hat reason that the Ottawa congress demanded from the Government better protection for the bi-lingual schools." La Patrie's View.

La Patrie, in a long editorial, said: 'The Bishop of London cites the cases of the schools of a number of French-Canadian parishes in which the last examinations, he says, revealed the capacity of nearly all the scholars. During his tour of inspection he was informed in one parish that the greater part of the boys from 11 to 16 years of age were unable to read.

"These facts may be true. But the conlusion which Mgr. Fallon draws from it is altogether false. "We have in the Province of Quebec




