Sold on the Local Market This Morning at \$6.75 Per Cwt.

PRICES ARE HIGH

supply Was Below the Demand Today-Butter and Eggs Are Going Up.

The heavy snowfall of last evening must have put the country roads in bad shape, as the quantity of hay on the market this morning was very small, and as the demand is exceptionally good, the farmers should have been out in full

The supply this morning was away below the demand, and as a consequence the price is high. This quality of the hay offered was about equal to the usual standard, and the majority of the loads sold at \$13 per ton. One load brought as high as \$13 50 a ton, but this was exceptional.

The demand for oats is very good at one load in; this article was very scarce on the square today, and there was only one load in; this sold for \$1 per cwt.

Butter and egg prices are beginning to move in an upward direction, and choice creamery butter is now offered at 27c to 28c per lb.
