STEAD'S PEN PICTURE
OF TURKISH SULTAN

An Intimate Conversation With
Monarch Who is Close
to Great War.

London, Sept. 29.—Mr. W. T. Stead has just been to see the Sultan of Turkey, and there is an interesting account of the interview in the Review of Reviews. The story takes on a new interest in view of the war scare over Tripoli.

Mr. Stead was warned that he must not expect to have anything but the most formal conversation, and that the presence of an interpreter would be indispensable, as the Sultan could not speak English. The matter of difficulty was, however, altogether removed by the presence of Loutfi Bey, the court chamberlain, who speaks English admirably.

The interview took place in the Dolma Bagtche Palace, "one of the most beautiful in Constantinople, and the most beautiful in Europe, and much the most beautiful in the world."

An officer in khaki uniform conducted Mr. Stead to the door of the Sultan, to whom he was at once presented by Sir Loutfi.

"His Majesty," says Mr. Stead, "advanced a step of two to meet me, shook hands, and motioned me to a chair. As he resumed his own I scrutinized him with interest and curiosity. The Sultan is a man somewhat below the middle height, somewhat past the prime of life, slightly stooped in body, and somewhat slow in his movements, and in his speech. He was older than any sovereign I had previously met, and he had a less mobile countenance. He wore the inevitable red fez—an institution with which not even the Parliament dares to interfere—and beneath his grey eyes there was a shadow of a somewhat vacuous expression. He wore a moustache, and his beard was trimmed short. He did not strike me as being a powerful man, neither did he give me the impression either of an alert mind or of resolute will."

"A somewhat dull, colorless face," said Mr. Stead, "with a curious suggestion in it of the old Lord Leaguers, Matt Harris, of Ballinacree!"

Over an hour's conversation. After some commonplace remarks Mr. Stead asked Sir Loutfi if he could speak freely. "Certainly," said the Chamberlain, "his Majesty desires it."

WILL SPLIT COSTS OF JAILER'S HOUSE

City and County Get Together in the Matter.

"We can do nothing more than secure temporary quarters," said Ald. Eckert. "Dr. Smith makes it imperative that we do something at once. If we have a chance to build a new house we might do so. Now we can do nothing of that sort."

Some discussion followed as to the proportionate amount to be borne by each municipality, and it was decided that the cost should be equally divided.

NORTHCOTE DEAD

Was Governor-General of Australia—Married Canadian Girl.

London, Sept. 29.—Henry Stafford Northcote, the first Baron Northcote, a former governor-general of Australia, died yesterday. He was born in 1848, and had been in the public service much of his life up to 1908.

He was private secretary successively to Lord Salisbury at Constantinople, the chancellor of the exchequer, and the secretary of war. He was surveyor-general of ordnance from 1886 to 1888, governor-general of Bombay, and governor-general of Australia from 1908 to 1909. He married the adopted daughter of Lord Mount Stephen.

STRAITHCONA AT MONTREAL
Says It Will Be No Difficult Matter to Secure His Successor.

Montreal, Sept. 29.—Interviewed this evening, Lord Strathcona, who arrived this morning, refused to discuss Canadian or imperial politics. He took an optimistic view of the European situation, expressing the opinion that the Turkish war would not be of long duration, and that other powers would not be embroiled. The Moroccan situation seems, he considers, to be settling itself satisfactorily.

The high commissioner said that he thought it would be no very difficult matter to secure a successor to occupy his office, saying that Canada seemed to have many able men.

Questioned as to the rumored scare in Scotland over the enormous emigration of young men to Canada, his lordship said that he did not think the immigration would hurt the Empire. Canada needed much British blood in the Northwest, so that that part of the Empire might develop into a great and loyal portion of the Empire.

Canada's destiny, he considers, is always to remain an integral part of the "greatest empire the world has ever seen."
