IN THE SPOTLIGHT

"TIPPERARY."

"It's a long way to Tipperary," the first drama dealing with the present European war to be played in this city and which William Anthony McGuire is credited with writing, drew a fair sized audience, mostly soldiers, to a local theatre last night.

Plot: Richard Travis and Miss Wetherbury, agent of the German intelligence system, have plans of all the ports and military bases in Ireland before British officers become suspicious of them. Travis and Miss Wetherbury in order to avert suspicion, turn the papers over to Allen Doone, while the latter thinks he is desperately loved by the woman spy. The soldiers arrive at the Doone house, where Travis is accused of being a spy. He denies the accusation, stating that he is a secret service man for the British Army, and has trailed Doone on whom the papers are found. Doone sentenced to be shot, manages to make his escape and joins his regiment at the battle front. He is wounded in a charge and, while under the care of the Red Cross, he sees Travis, the spy, leaving the General's tent with valuable papers. In his attempt to get away from Doone, the young Irish recruit is free to marry his sweetheart, who has enlisted as a Red Cross nurse.

The audience was given a run for its money in the way of action. There were machine guns in action, German dirigibles, and wireless, and in the final act the stage soldiers in military charge, wasted some odd hundred blank cartridges. It was truly a military play.

During the performance the audience was entertained by the "Tipperary Quartet," who sang a number of Irish melodies, which, judging from the applause, met with the approval of the audience.

William Wells, the star, in the role of Allen Doone, the Irish patriot, was supported by Miss Mary Marlowe, as Kathleen, the Red Cross nurse, and Misses Fairfax and Fairbank, William Bonnell and Frank J. Woods.

BIG STIR IN BLYTH TELEPHONE CIRCLES

Local Company Buys Bell Interests and Trouble Is Threatened.

Re Feb. 23.—At last a question of the advisability of the Great Rural Telephone Company purchasing the Bell Telephone Company's interests in Blyth has been settled for the present at least.

There have been two meetings of the subscribers to try and come to an amicable settlement of the matter, but each time the subscribers voted against the proposition. As a last resort the councillors, who are back of the rural line, held a special meeting and met two of the head men of the Bell Company and made the purchase for the sum of \$400,000 the interests to be transferred by March 1.

HOLLOW VICTORY FOR TURK FORCES

Capture of Bortchka of No Strategic Value, Says Man Who's Been There.

That the reported capture of Turkish troops of the village of Bortchka, forty miles inland from Batoum, the chief port on the south coast of the Black Sea, which was described in German and Turkish dispatches as "a brilliant victory," is of no military importance at all, was the opinion expressed to The Advertiser by John H. Townsend, general manager of the Electrical Construction Company, who has spent many years in Eastern Europe, and who during the years 1907 and 1908 was stationed in this very district as superintendent engineer in charge of the copper mines at Batoum, about forty miles farther up from the coast.

"I know something about military matters," he said, "and I cannot see in the fact that this place has any particular significance or that it can help the Germans or the Turks in any way. Its only strategic importance lies in the fact that the village is on the bank of the river, and on the main road to the copper mines."

"But the enemy can make no use of the copper in any case. Even if they could work the mine, which they would have great difficulty in doing, seeing that the foremen are all either Englishmen or Americans, who would not work it for them, they would not be able to transport it by pack wagon."

"The only routes out from the mines are through the Crimea, which is held by the Russians, or by water across the Black Sea, which the Russians hold the whip hand. In any case there is no railway within about a hundred miles of the mines, and the only means of transportation is by pack wagon."

"You can have some idea of the difficulties in the way when I tell you that the only road from the mines is that to Batoum, which is a silted out, and which lies between mountains, where a comparatively small force could defy an army. With half a dozen men would suffice to hold the pass against any force."

In Constantinople in 1908.

Mr. Townsend was in Constantinople in 1908, when the rebellion broke out, and he was held up in the capital because no trains were allowed to leave. He says that from his knowledge of the Turkish situation he is convinced that their participation in the war was not brought about by any love for Germany, but simply because the country was in need of money, which Germany supplied.

"While I was there," he said, "the Turks expressed the greatest admiration for the revolution, and a band which was playing outside the hotel where I was staying struck up 'God Save the King,' and, of course, at once rose and sang off my hat. Immediately a number of Turks who were standing around, who knew by my action that I was English, hastened over and shook hands with me, and I never heard them show appreciation of a German in any similar way, and I never heard them speak in a friendly way about Germany."

The mine of which Mr. Townsend was the superintendent is owned by the Caucasus Copper Company, the headquarters of which are in London, England, but he says the general opinion was that the greater proportion of the capital invested in it was American, and that, in fact, Pierpont Morgan held the controlling interest.
