### SUNK BY BRITISH

Transport Mosel Also Captured and Garrison at Amara Surrenders.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, June 9.-8:10 p.m.-The Turkish gunboat Marmaris has been sunk and the Turkish transport Mosul has been captured, according to an official statement given out this evening by the British Government. The action took place in the Persian Gulf region.

The text of the statement follows: Fuller reports of our advance up the Tigris River and the occupation of Amara show that as the result of an action on May 31 and June 1, the enemy's force, which had been threatening Kurnah for some time, became completely demoralized.

"No resistance appears to have been offered to the small party pursuing by river, the Turks trying to escape as fast as they coud in nahalas and steamers. The former surrendered on being vertaken, while the Turkish gunboa Marmaris was sunk and the transport Mosul captured,

Although the strength of the force which arrived at Amara in the Comet launches was quite insignificant, the entire garrison, which numbered over thousand, surrendered, including the Turkish civil governor of Amara, Halim Bey, the commandant of the force recently opposing us at Kurnah, Said Ullah, commandant of two are brigade battalions.

Shortly after our occupation of Amera the advanced guard troops of Daghastani's column, which had hastily retreated from the Kherka Valley, enered the town and were captured. The remainder of this force, estimated at about 2,000, fled, leaving a heavy gun

The remnants of the enemy, who so far have escaped capture, are retiring In a state of disorganization, many having discarded their arms."
