**SEVEN CITY BLOCKS
PAVED THIS YEAR****Work of City Engineer's Department Far Ahead of Last Year.**

An early start, and better working conditions, have enabled the city engineer's staff to greatly surpass the paving program of last year in the work of 1921. Seven city blocks, which total almost one mile, have been completely paved this year, while last year surface paving was not commenced until July. Up to May 17 concrete pavement base for 20,000 yards had been laid, in contrast to 12,000 yards up to the same date in 1920. Over 35,000 yards of grading has been done this year, while in 1920 up to May 17 only 18,000 yards had been finished.

**BATH, N.Y., MAKES AN
OFFER FOR BUFFALO****Price Offered \$175 F.O.B. —
Problem Is Handling of the Animal.**

An offer has already been received by General Manager E. V. Buchanan for the bull buffalo which the parks committee of the public utilities commission have decided must be disposed of in some way if peace is to reign in the city of Buffalo. At the present time there are three buffalo in the enclosure, a cow and two bulls. Each of the gentlemen seek the favors of the lady, with result that the possibility of a serious feud arising out of a mutual jealousy is giving the keepers considerable worry and anxiety. The offer for the animal comes from Bath, N. Y., the price offered being \$175 f.o.b. the cars. Just how to get the somewhat pugnacious gentleman on to the cars is a problem worrying the park officials. Further difficulty has been added to the task by the refusal of the railway companies to accept Mr. Buffalo unless he is handed over to their cars securely crated.

These big clinics have been handled easily by the doctors and child welfare nurses, owing to the excellent help given them by such local institutions as the Victoria Hospital, Alumnus, St. Joseph's Alumnus, Mothers' Club, officers of the Child Welfare Association, Isabel Hampden, Chapter, I. O. D. E., and private nurses in the city.

Grant, secretary of the referendum committee, that if anything was left undone when the law provided for the Ontario vote was passed that it would be covered by legislation to be introduced at the present session of Parliament.

**LUCAN JURY VIEWS
REMAINS OF MRS.
WALTER SOVEREIGN****Evidence Will Be Taken at
Adjourned Inquest Some

Mrs. Sovereign was 38 years of age. Besides her husband she is survived by five small children. Lorna, the injured one, is the youngest. The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

**UNEMPLOYED ARE
INCENSED; CLAIM
'AD' IS MISLEADING**

Registering indignation in no unimpeachable manner a large number of men in the course of their daily visit to the local employment bureau today, reported that they had been badly misled by an advertisement in a local paper this morning, intimating that twenty experienced carpenters and fifty laborers could find work by applying at a certain address in the north end of the city. All day long eager applicants responded to the call at the specified place, but they could find very scant success.

It developed, the men state, that operations were already under way for the construction of a cottage of the average proportions, and the person in charge of the task intimated that room could be made for three or four men at 25 cents an hour or 40 cents if the applicant should prove a "good" worker. The local bureau, however, was not in touch with this particular case at the time, but volunteered later to supply the number advertised without delay. The offer was accepted, and a number were forthwith directed again to the scene, only to return dissatisfied.

Commented upon the incident several citizens expressed the fear that such tactics might reasonably prove detrimental to the local situation. As one explained: "It is not to be expected that numbers of unemployed men, who are in the habit of scanning the 'Help Wanted' columns of the newspapers of the various communities, will naturally jump to the conclusion that construction work is going right ahead in London, and that carpenters and laborers are in demand. When one reads such an advertisement it is a logical conclusion to arrive at by any who are unfortunately not on the spot to know any different. It would not be at all surprising if this particular item, by a party who wished only to be sure of picking four men out of fifty or more, would attract a number from Toronto and other centers where the employment problem is much more pronounced than it has ever been in this city."

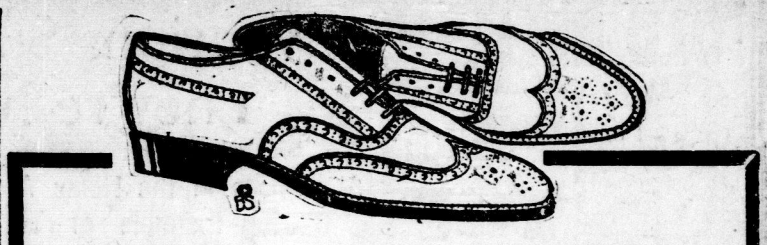
He said he had one blue eye and one brown eye," asked the lady. The father named in the affirmative, and the lady directed him to the house where his wife was living with her second husband.
