Without a dissenting voice or without any discussion the council adopted the street railway committee's report recommending that the fare on the St. Thomas Street Railway be nereased to five cents a ride and five tickets for 25 cents, instead of six tickets for 25 cents. The increase goes into effect Wednesday morning.

The council sanctioned the appoint ment of an assistant to Assessment nissioner Freek at a salary of \$150 a month. A third member was appointed to the board to act in the capacity of referee when required at

a salary of \$10 per day Want Records Kept.

The council also recommended that the measurements of every building, its age, value, specifications and rental value be recorded in a set of books to be kept at the city hall. It was found on consulting City Solicitor Doherty that the council had no power to pass a bylaw by which all second-hand stores would be forced to report their purchases each week to the police department Such an order, Mr. Doherty declared, could be given only by the police
