MALCOLM BRUCE OUT ON \$1,500 BAIL

Charged With Saying He Hoped To See Union Jack Dragged in Mud.

SURRENDERS SELF

Many Miners Are Expected To Rally to His Aid.

Special to The Advertiser. Sydney, N. S., May 29.—Malcolm Bruce, editor of The Worker, Toronto, is alleged to have said at a meeting held in Glace Bay on Sunday, May 6, at the Savoy Theatre: "I hope to see the day when the Union Jack will be dragged in the mud and the red flag will be flying in Canada as the stand-ard of freedom for the workers." He surrendered himself to Magistrate A. B. MacGillivray at Glace Bay last evening shortly after 6 o'clock. He was admitted to bail, the amount

he was admitted to pail, the amount being \$1,500.

The preliminary hearing will take place in the Glace Bay town hall be-fore Magistrate MacGillivray on Thursday morning. It is said that a largenumber of affidavits have been taken at Glace Bay, in which the makers swear that Bruce did not make the statement quoted as his. These will no doubt be presented at the hearing, which will be an event of unusual interest throughout the whole district.

J. B. McLachlan, secretary-treasurer of the U. M. W., in an interview with The Advertiser this morning, stated that the miners' organization as a unit will not undertake the defence of Bruce, who has been arrest-ed for alleged sedition. But individual members of the union were prepared in great numbers to come to his assistance. The Advertiser asked Mr. McLachlan if he had any statement to make about Bruce's ar-
