

GRIM ACTION SEEN IN 'CAPTAIN BLOOD'

Old Days of Knights and Piracy Portrayed in Picture at Capitol.

"Captain Blood" Rafael Sabatini's stirring drama of the buccaner days, remains at the Capitol Theatre for the balance of the week. The picture has proven one of the most popular shown in the city this season. "Captain Blood" and the "Sea Hawk" mark a growing popularity of stories of adventure with an historical basis. Perhaps the interest in such films is evidenced by the fact that most fans have read much of the history of the world in story form when children, and so when a picture from one of Sabatini's books appears it recalls the dramatic over "Captain Kidd" and "Treasure Island" and other such works. The historical background becomes a friendly medium between a friendly producer and the theatre-goer.

However, it does not have previous knowledge of the days of old, when knights were bold and piracy was a hobby of the rich, reeking with power. "Captain Blood" would still be entertaining, for it is interesting from the start. It is full of action. There is J. Warren Kerrigan, who heads a pleasing, not to say strong, cast.

There are several more scenes where galleons go into battle under a full sail, the crews fighting desperately with cutlasses and sword, the small cannon vomiting a devastating fire that tears away mast and spar and hull till the whole disappears beneath the waves. A touch of brilliant orange and red in battle scenes adds vividness to the action.

The picture is rich in costume and design, and it does of the glories of England at the time of James II, when men even more than women took the powder puff seriously and wore their faces and silks more proudly than they do their hats now. It is a pretty picture. A wonderful contract for the grim action which follows, when turbelions give way to the ragged dress of slaves, and laces are thrown aside for the knife.

To have enjoyed Sabatini's books is to thrill over "Captain Blood." It is a real picture of real men who lived in a very real past. It is good entertainment.

BEXLEY PASTOR'S WIFE COMMITTED SUICIDE

Coroner Declares That Theory of Murder Is Incorrect—Scientists Differ.

Associated Press Despatch. Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 4.—Mrs. Addie Sheatsley wife of the Rev. C. V. Sheatsley, pastor of Christ Evangelical Lutheran church of Bexley, a suburb, whose body was found in the furnace of the Sheatsley home, committed suicide, Coroner J. A. Murphy held in his formal report of the tragedy filed with the county clerk of courts today.

Coroner Murphy from the start held to his view that Mrs. Sheatsley deliberately crawled into the furnace, although C. E. Long, chemist, and Dr. H. M. Brundage, pathologist, after a series of tests, said it was their opinion she met death outside the furnace.

Canada Unalarmed by Restriction Move

Claim Proposed Limit On Immigrations Into U. S. Would Aid Dominion.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Dec. 4.—The recommendation of U. S. Secretary of Labor Davis in his annual report, that quota restrictions be placed on citizens of Canada desiring to enter the American republic, is not viewed with perceptible alarm here. While the department of immigration and colonization was quite reluctant today to discuss the question, it has been intimated that the enactment of any legislation by congress that prevented a large exodus to the United States would probably be to the benefit of Canada as a whole, and result in keeping more of our citizens in this country.

A further recommendation of Secretary Davis for administrative restriction of all immigration under existing legal limits in times of unemployment is evidently along the lines of the present Canadian immigration act on this point, which makes provision for the passing of an order-in-council at any time regulating the influx of United States and other citizens, conditional on opportunities for employment, and economic and industrial conditions.

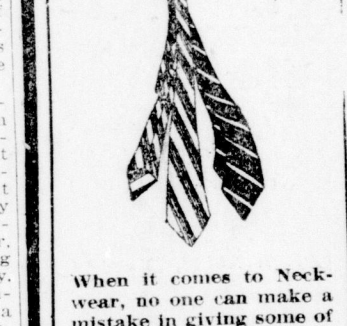
A wrecking tug which went to her assistance lost her way in a heavy snowstorm, and also went on the rocks, but was later released.

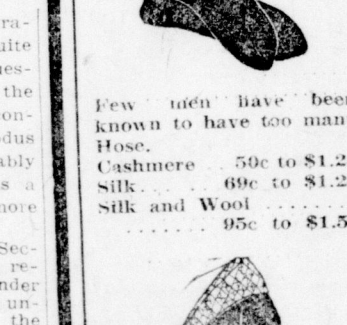

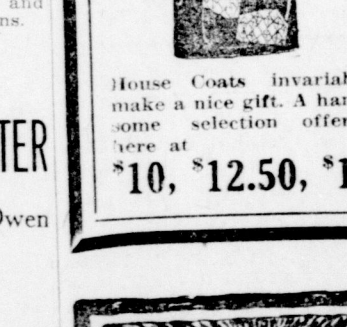

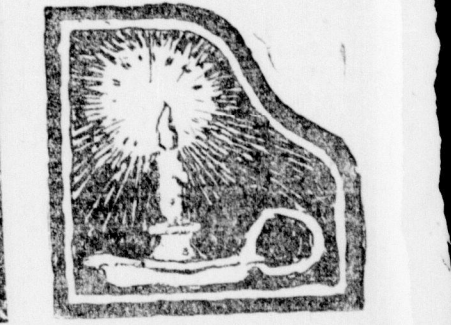
