CECIL L. SNYDER IS ELECTED AS PREFECT OF UNIVERSITY

Defeats Walter Rennie by
Narrow Margin of Nine
Votes.

INTEREST KEEN

Cheers and congratulations echoed through the halls of the college of arts yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock when the last ballot showed that Cecil L. Snyder had been elected prefect of the University of Western Ontario for the year 1925-1926.

As soon as the word went out from the students' council headquarters in room 6, Walter Rennie, unsuccessful candidate, was the first to offer his congratulations to the prefect-elect. Not since 1923 has there been an election for the prefecture. Last year Grant L. Wiley, arts '25, was chosen by acclamation, and the interest centered about the sub-prefect battle.

This year two of the most popular men in university circles were put up for office. Cecil L. Snyder, a St. Thomas boy, has held several high positions in the student body. He is editor-in-chief of the Western University Gazette and president of the History and Political Science club. Last year he was editor-in-chief of the year book.

He represented the students at the international students' convention at Indianapolis, Indiana, last year.

Walter Rennie has been leader of the university orchestra and during the past year has brought the musical organization up to a high standard of excellence. The high regard for the two candidates was expressed in the vote which gave Cecil Snyder 180 votes, while Walter Rennie came a close second with 171 votes, a difference of nine votes.

The campaign came to a close Tuesday afternoon, when speeches were made by the candidates. The balloting was carried out without demonstrations of any kind. An eager and expectant crowd thronged the corridors all day and while the results were being tallied the halls were filled with a speculative crowd. The race was so close that none would venture an opinion as to the outcome.

Is Sub-Prefect.

Kathleen B. Richardson, arts '26, was elected sub-prefect over Louis Garbutt and Marion Garbutt. The

three girls being well known and popular with their fellow students, the race was a close one.

Representatives were elected from the various years to the new student parliament which will be presided over by the prefect-elect. This parliament consists of 26 students. Those elected yesterday were: Arts '25, Gladys Ferrier, Eugene Durrant, Grace Gibberd, James Dean, Stuart Brownlee and Reginald Apperard. In arts '27 Walter Bagnall headed the polls, then came Marion Drew, Richard Bowen, O. M. Morgan, H. D. Ball and Olga Miller.

William McCully headed arts '28, with A. W. Hoppins, Herbert Uren and Mary Watson following closely. They will represent their year. In Meds. '30 G. P. Howell, B. L. Kelly, R. A. Maxwell and A. MacCallum were the representatives elected. When the university opens in the fall the first year Arts and first year Meds. will each elect two representatives.

Heads Literary Society.

Stuart Brownlee was made president of the literary society for the coming year. Jim Allen, opposing candidate, ran him a close second. Mr. Brownlee has rendered excellent service to the club. Last year he was vice-president.

Mary Wilkey was elected vice-president by acclamation. Roy Allen was made second vice-president. Celia Little secretary, and William McCully treasurer.

Those in charge of the elections and assisted in counting the ballots were: Eunice Moorhouse, George Bond, Grand Wiley, Lionel Rinn, Cyril Sullivan, Jack Givena, William F. Parsons, Fred Rose, Gerald Jordan, Edna Ivenson, Marion Hart and Richard Bowen.

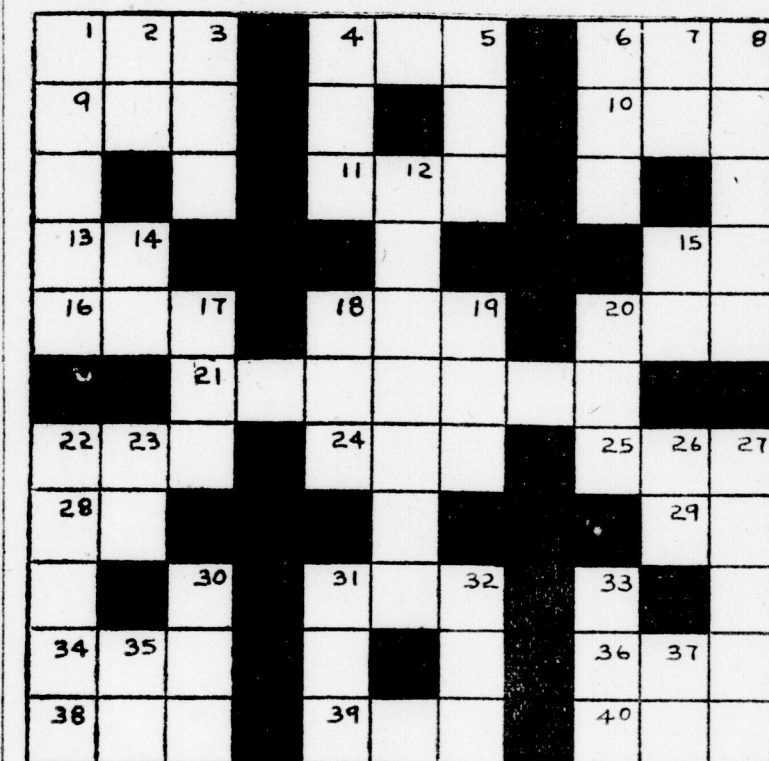
SOCIALISTS BIG WINNERS IN GUARDIAN ELECTIONS

AVERAGE OF \$200 PAID FOR CATTLE

Total of More Than \$7,000
Received at Pure Bred
Jersey Sale.

Thirty-five pure bred Jersey cattle changed hands in a successful sale conducted by the Ontario Jersey Cattle club at the Western Fair grounds yesterday afternoon. More than \$7,000 in all was taken in, an average of \$200 being received for the sale of each cow. Belvoir Farm, owned by E. S. Little, paid the highest price of the day for a pure bred Jersey cow from B. H. Bull & Son, Brampton. The animal was sold for \$650. The average price of \$200 received for each head of cattle is the highest average ever reached in a combination sale of other breeds. The fact that milk is now sold on test, and Jersey cattle are desired by breeders of other cattle to bring their milk up to a higher standard, is responsible for the success of the sale.

W. Elmo Ashton, field manager of the Ontario Jersey Cattle club, acted as sales manager, with L. E. Franklin of Toronto, auctioneer. John Pringle was secretary.

H. E. Farrow, Oakville, was the most prominent lawyer, purchasing six or seven head. He bought the only bull, E. S. Little was second and bought three head. There were about 25 buyers and 500 spectators.

CHARACTER REVEALED BY LINES OF THE FOOT

Analysis Club Discusses Relation of Foot To Aptitudes.

A very interesting discussion was held at the London character analysis club last night. Mr. Higgins was in the chair, and handled the discussion in the absence of the regular lecturer for the evening.

To the student of character study the feet tell their tale just as much as the hands, fingers, face or stature. The individual with the small, narrow, finely shaped feet is usually of a much different mental calibre than the individual with the large, heavy, heavy feet. Large, bony feet are usually found on the heavy motive type of man or woman. Where you find the small feet on a big, heavy man you can look for a complicated individual. To the student of character analysis the small, finely shaped feet are usually found on the mental type, and best suited for work along mental lines. That is a man of this make-up would make a better accountant than he would a construction engineer.

The student of character analysis does not say that a man of the mental type could not be a construction engineer. What he does claim is that the man would, for the same amount of energy expended, get much farther in the position of an accountant than as an engineer. Every man has certain inborn biological traits that are stronger, and it is to his advantage to use those that are strongest.

The educational committee presented a new plan of handling the lectures for the weekly meetings which meet with the approval of the club. A permanent board of lecturers are being appointed to take the entire charge of handling the lectures and prepare the new data for presentation to the club. By this plan the educational committee hopes to present to the members of the club real interesting and vitally instructive lectures.

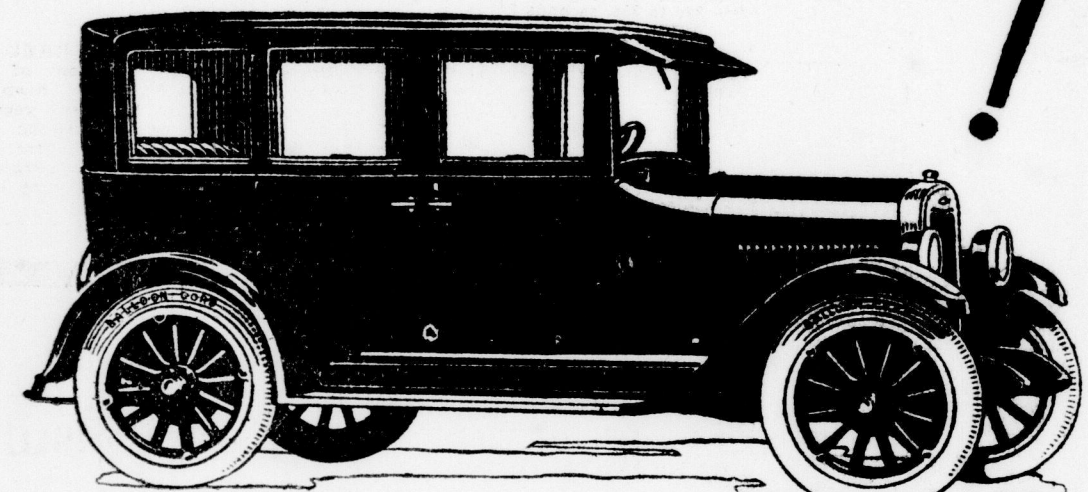
MOBILIZATION ORDERED BY GEN. ISMET PASHA

Associated Press Despatch. Constantinople, April 9.—General Ismet Pasha, the premier, addressing the national assembly at Angora, Tuesday, declared that because of the threatening aspect of the revolt in Kurdistan and in view of other dangers to which the country was exposed it had been found necessary to order a complete mobilization. The premier admitted that the revolt was much graver than newspaper reports had indicated. The insurgents had attacked places widely apart, such as Malatia, Mardin and Melazger, and even a fortnight ago threatened Erzin. The premier added that he feared the revolt would assume even greater proportions. The government's prompt military measures, however, had begun to be felt.

In Canada's Parliament

TODAY.

Ottawa, April 9.—The senate stands adjourned until April 14, and the house of commons until April 14.

YESTERDAY.

The senate did not sit. The following took part in the budget debate in the house: W. Irvine, Labor, East Calgary; A. B. Hudson, Liberal, South Winnipeg; H. E. Maybee, Conservative, Northumberland; and J. L. Brown, Progressive, Lisear. The debate was adjourned by Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor.

THREE CANADIANS HELD IN WAR VETERAN'S DEATH

Associated Press Despatch. Dedham, Mass., April 8.—Three men, all Canadians, were arrested in Milton today for questioning in connection with the death of Alexander Buchanan, Canadian war veteran, whose body was found in an abandoned cellar hole in Waverly last Saturday. A gas mask of a type used in the United States navy had been attached to the head and saturated with chloroform.

The three gave their names as Rene Boucher, Edward Tremblay and Joseph Chablin. They were held on a technical charge of vagrancy and taken to the Dedham jail.

OFFICER IS FREED.

Associated Press Despatch. Orleans, France, April 8.—Captain Jacques Sadoul, French army officer charged with desertion while on a military mission to Russia in 1919, was acquitted by a majority vote of the court martial here which has been trying him for the past ten days.
