The siain student was John Henry Klassin, 25, of Mankato, Kan., and his companion, James R. Mitcham, a son of a wealthy Texas oil operator. Eight men, including Archie Carlini, 21, named by the police as the leader of the attack, are under arrest, confessions having been obtained from four of them.

Klassin's skull was fractured, apparently by a paving stone, and he died without regaining consciousness after being picked up by police war.
