London Markets

Thursday, May 3rd, 1888. The market to-day was fairly attended. Grain deliveries were small and wheat went up to 11.45 per cent, and one buyer was reported to have paid 11.50.

Other cereals at our quotations. The outside market is getting smaller, and now carcasses are being limited to calves principally and a few heaves. Beef is firm, at 8.50 to 8.75 per cwt. Veal sells all the way from 10 to 12 per cwt. Owing to the high price and increased demand for milk cows a great many calves are being killed young in order to obtain the milk, and hence veal is getting to be a bit scarce.

Poultry held about the same as our last quotations. Potatoes were easy, at from 1.25 to 1.50 per bag. Hay was plentiful, and it went down to 10 per ton by noon. There is plenty of hay in the country.

Milk cows scarce, at 42 to 45 a piece. Cattle - Receipts, 2,500. The market for cattle was steady, good to choice corn fed, \$4.25 to \$4.50 common to medium, \$3.75 to \$4.00, and \$2.50 to \$3.00 for cows.

Sheep - Receipts, 1,000. The market for sheep was steady, good to choice, \$2.50 to \$3.00. Hogs - Receipts, 1,000. The market for hogs was steady, good to choice, \$4.00 to \$4.50.
