THE GALE OF SUNDAY NIGHT.

THREE VESSELS ASHORE.

The schooner General Harney, Captain Roeder, arrived from Whidby Island yesterday morning with a full cargo of hay and small stock. The Harney had nearly reached this harbor on Sunday night when the gale from the east drove her across to the American shore. She experienced a very narrow escape from wreck, and one of her crew was seriously injured by having his foot caught in the flapping main-sheet and being dashed to the deck. The Harney reports three American square-riggers as having been driven ashore during the gale. The ship Mary Glover is on the rocky shore near Port Discovery, and has sustained serious injury. The bark Iconium is on Point-no-Point, but does not appear to have received much damage; and the bark George Washington was blown almost high and dry upon Dungeness Spit where she lay yesterday morning, with the coln, Captain White, endeavoring to pull her off. These disasters must have occurred vessels passed up the Straits in company on Bay. Sunday, about 3 p.m. They were all in ballast, and bound from San Francisco for the mills to load with lumber.
