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An Insane Mother's Death.

MOSKOWITZ, Mich., Nov. 21.—On Monday, Mrs. Nathaniel Strang, of Jacksonville, Mich., tried to kill herself and daughter with arsenic, as she feared that murderers were after them. A doctor saved the woman, but Mrs. Strang remained in a state of great nervous excitement. During the temporary absence of her husband, the two daughters with a solution of Paris green, and handing one to her daughter, and a handsome girl 18 years of age, who, like the other herself, she drank her own dose, and forced the girl to swallow the arsenic. The girl died in a few minutes. Mrs. Strang died about midnight in the hospital, and her daughter about an hour later.

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A. E. of C. Conspiracy.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 20.—Representative John R. Byrne, of the Knights of Labor, was arrested at Scottsdale, Pa., this evening on a charge of conspiracy preferred by ex-Representative Edward Callaghan. The information also includes "Master" William M. Eckhart, Powderly and Peter Wise, a local labor leader. Mr. Powderly will be placed under arrest on his return from home, but will be arrested at the earliest possible moment. The suit grew out of a quarrel between Callaghan and Byrne, which Callaghan alleges that he was boycotted and injured in his business by the Knights of Labor, through the agency of Byrne, Eckhart, and Wise. Byrne was released under bail.

A Young Lady's Crime.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., Nov. 21.—Miss Sweland, a young lady well connected here, has been arrested charged with forging A. W. Miss Sweland has been in similar trouble before.

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All on Board Last.

NEW BEDFORD, Me., Nov. 21.—A square rigged vessel, supposed to be a bark, went ashore on the south side of Cady Hook about six o'clock this morning and went to pieces. Soon after workmen on the life saving station made out her name as the William. A man was described coming out of the cabin just before the vessel broke up and was afterwards seen clinging to the spar and waving for help. He lost his hold and was drowned. A body was washed ashore a little later. The vessel was loaded with cargo. It is feared all hands were lost.

PORT JERVIS, N. Y., Nov. 21.—A man found drowned in the Delaware and Hudson canal at Bolton Basin about a week ago, has been identified as Peter J. Rafferty, a wealthy German of Minneapolis. He left his home through family difficulties and started for Luxemburg, Germany. He evidently became demented and got off the train at Port Jervis, and wandered where his body was found. Sixty dollars were given to his relatives, and the man's name was missing. He was about 75 years of age.

Notwithstanding the accident and the fact that her starboard engine only could be used, she made good time, and arrived here yesterday afternoon at the Queen's Hotel, and both are safe and victorious.
