It is more than probable that their judgment was blunted by their desires.

We think, too, that another grievous disappointment is in store for the Liberals. They counted upon as large a non conform ist vote as was cast in their favor in 1886 and previous elections. We are mistaken if it will not be found that they have grossly miscalculated. Their co-religionists in Ulster have been active and urgent in trying to persuade them to vote against Gladstone and Home Rule, and it will be indeed singular if their appeals have been without effect.
