Potato Varities

(Experimental Farms Note)

The following is the average yield per acre for a seven year period of the ten leading varieties of potatoes tested in duplicate on uniform test plots at the Dominion Experimental Farm at Nappan: British Queen 412-6 bushels, Arran Chief 395.9 bushels, Floneer 376.7 bushels, Factor 350.3 bushels, Rawling's Kidney 349.4 bushels, King Edward 337 bushels, Green Mountain 330.5 bushels, Irish Cobbler 321 bushels, Carman No. 1 307.2 bushels, The first four or varieties were imported from England in 1906 and for the first four or five years did not succumb to leaf roll or mosaic but retained a heavy green foliage until late in the season.
