COUNCIL DISCUSS

POLICE MATTERS

New Arrangement With Policeman so That Town is Protected at Night

(From the Gloucester Northern Light)

Another special meeting of the Town Council was convened last Wednesday evening, for the purpose of considering the immediate establishment of a lookup for the town, and the appointment of another, or other policemen, and defining their duties, etc.

All the members of the Council were present, except Ald. Power, who was absent from the town.

A lengthy discussion regarding the present condition of police matters in the town took place, and was taken part in by every member of the Board. Every one recognized the importance of taking immediate steps to make provision for police protection of the town, other than what was existing at the present time, as the people were feeling very unsafe through the night.

When the town was not receiving the attention of any officer. This feeling of almost alarm had been very much increased since it became known that Wm. Gagnier had escaped from the jail, and the members of the Council all recognized the necessity of at once taking steps to allay the general feeling of insecurity. It was then moved by Ald. Shirley, seconded by Ald. Hachey, that the Police Committee be empowered to arrange with Policeman Ramsay, to go on duty at three p. m. and to continue until 4 a. m., for which an increase of \$5.00 per month salary would be allowed. He would also be ready for calls at any hour between 4 a. m. and 8 p. m., for each of which he would receive a fee of \$1.00. This was carried, and Officer Ramsay has accepted the arrangement.

It was moved by Ald. Hachey, seconded by Ald. Poirier, that James Boudreau, the special officer appointed a few days ago, be released, and his wages paid for the time he has been on duty. Carried.

Canada Wire and Iron Goods Co., in reply to the Town Clerk's inquiry in regard to steel cages for the lock up, were read. Ald. Kent moved, seconded by Ald. Hachey, that one single steel cell with steel floor at \$135.00 and one double steel cell with steel floor at \$255.00, be ordered. Carried.

Clerk of the Peace Gilbert, was heard in reference to the Grand Jury's recommendations concerning the jail, which he read to the Council.

Mr. Gilbert also requested that the Council listen to the remarks of Mr. Angus McLean of the Bathurst Lumber Co., and to Mr. A. G. McIntyre of the Pulp Co., who wished to make statements in regard to the difficulties in the way of the establishment of the pulp plant here. Mr. McLean's remarks were practically the same as those published in this paper last week in the form of an interview, and received a very attentive hearing from the Council.
