CHAPLIN REPLIES TO SIR C. TUPPER

And Says He Will Fight Against the Removal of the Cattle Embargo.

London, May 12 [Telegram special.]—
The question of the admission of Canadian cattle into Great Britain and the efforts to lift the existing embargo has developed a controversy which in certain high circles bids fair to grow sultry. The letter which Sir Charles Tupper addressed to The Times on the 5th inst. combating statements made in the House of Commons on the 13th ult. by Mr. Henry Ghaplin, and to the effect that cattle imported from Canada in the years 1890, 1891 and 1892 carried pleuro-pneumonia with them and infected the herds in Scotland, embraced an unqualified denial of the speaker's assertions.

Mr. Chaplin thereupon renews the attack in reply to Sir Charles' denial, and reiterates his statement that the responsibility for the disease in Scotland in 1892 was with

in reply to Sir Charles' denial, and reiterates his statement that the responsibility for the disease in Scotland in 1892 was with Canadian cattle imported that year. Scotland, he adds, was absolutely free from the disease prior to that. Regarding the proposal to exempt Canadian cattle from slaughter at the port of debarkation Mr. Chaplin says that in his opinion such a course would expose both owners and breeders to great risk.

"No government," said he, "would be justified in sanctioning it," and concluded, "I will resist with every means in my power any attempt to give effect to the views urged upon the Board of Agriculture by the Marquis of Ripon."


