MARINE NEWS

D. Sproule & Co., Digby, received 5,000 lbs. mixed fish from Yarmouth. The Cape Cod Canal is closed by ice. Steamers have been sent to break a channel.

Digby Courier: More ice has been seen in Digby Basin this season than for the past twenty-five years.

Schr. Dorothy Smart on her last trip stocked \$4,260. This is the largest of any schooner that has ever entered the port of Digby.

Liverpool Advance: Owing to the very unfavorable weather the past week our fishing fleet have had but one day's fishing.

Schr. Nellie, Capt. Burgess, which landed a cargo of soft coal for W. E. VanBlarcom, Digby, sailed for St. John, to load for a United States port.

Steamer John L. Cann, with the steamer Percy Cann in tow, left Canso Friday morning for Yarmouth, where the Percy will be fitted with a new crank shaft.

S. S. Governor Cobb had the smallest passenger list of the season on Wednesday. She only landed in Yarmouth 32 passengers from Boston, and the majority were local.

Maritime Fish Corporation arrivals at Digby: From vessels: 54,115 lbs. haddock, 16,260 lbs. cod, 7,500 lbs. cusk; other sources, 7,682 lbs. haddock, 6,728 lbs. cod, 785 tons cusk.

Yarmouth Telegram: Judge Grieson arrived in Yarmouth on Tuesday and registered at the Grand. He has been engaged for the past three days hearing evidence in the case of the Sanford fish dealers vs. Rodney Bros. & Co., Boston.

Digby arrivals: The schr. Dorothy M. Smart, Capt. Snow, on the 3rd, with 80,000 lbs. mixed fish for the Maritime Fish Corporation Ltd.; Schr. Dorothy P. Sarty, Capt. Longmire, on the 10th, with 70,000 lbs. mixed fish for the Maritime Fish Corporation, Ltd.

The Gypsum Packet Co. are making extensive repairs on their tug Chester, at Hantsport, this winter. The deck is being raised about two feet, and other improvements made which will make this boat A1 for the coming season's work. She is in command of Captain Robert Taylor, of Hantsport, formerly of Port Greville.

The dynamo for the steamer Keith Cann was received in St. John the first of last week and was brought to Yarmouth on that steamer Thursday evening. Work of installing will commence at once and it is expected to have the ship electric lighted for the next trip to St. John.

Digby Courier: St. Clair Jones, of Weymouth, who built the tern schooner Speedway, recently launched at Little Brook, Digby, refused an offer considerably beyond the \$100,000 mark for the vessel just before she was launched. The vessel is over 400 tons net and is going on a voyage to South Africa from St. John on a charter that brings the owner a snug sum.

One of the old fleet that is again going to be in commission is the tern schooner Albert D. Mills. This vessel was wrecked in the big July storm that swept southern waters while she was en route to Martineque from Mobile, with a cargo of staves. Later she was towed back to Mobile and a derelict and has now been purchased by the Gulf Wreckage and Salvage Company.

The vessel is now in dry dock and notwithstanding the heavy pounding she received is said to be in fair condition. At the time she was wrecked the Mills was owned by the Bahama Islands and was sailed by Captain Loren H. Walters now master of the tern schooner David C. Ritter, now at Philadelphia.

Annapolis Spectator: By the quantity of material accumulating at the Annapolis Shipping Co.'s yard, it would not be surprising if work on at least two more vessels will begin as soon as the present craft on the stocks is launched. It is indeed rumored that one of the new vessels will be a four-master and at least she will have an auxiliary screw propeller. Some idea of the machinery in operation at the yard may be gained from the fact that during January the power used 28 tons of coal besides all the chips and waste wood available. The stream of men going to and from work makes a cheerful procession.

Liverpool Advance: The town authorities feeling the need of a light and bell buoy on the bar off Fort Point, asked our Dominion representative, the Hon. W. S. Fielding, to bring this need to the notice of the Marine and Fisheries Dept. Capt. F. Johnson, Superintendent of Lights and Buys, came here to investigate the matter a few weeks ago, with the result that these improvements were placed in position last Saturday by the light steamer. Every day and night during this cold winter the harbor has been open clear up to the bridge. With this light and bell buoy in position on the narrowest part of the channel, so vessels can pass in safety on dark nights and thick weather days, the port is an ideal one. Seamen claim that now Liverpool is a safe port to run for in any storm.

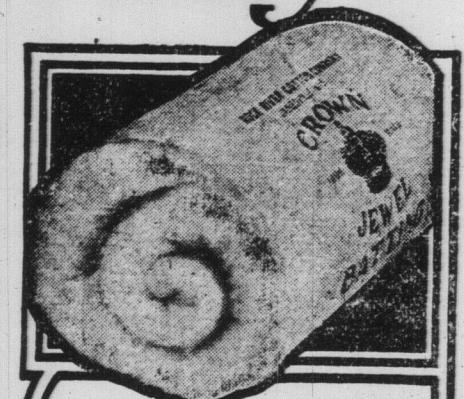

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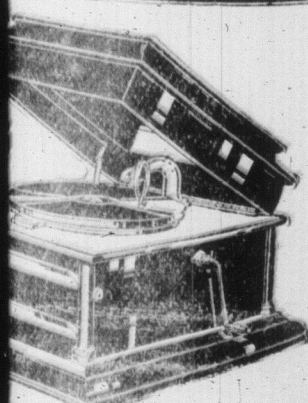
