Wondrous Works.

The manufacture of the American Pianos and Organs by Messrs. Cornish at their immense factories at Washington, New Jersey, is one of the most interesting exhibitions possible. The vast works are really wonderful, and the making of the Cornish American Pianos and Organs can be followed in all stages from the rough lumber brought in from the extensive drying kilns, and cut up by the big circular saws in the lower end of the first machine-floor to the examination of the exquisitely finished product in the warerooms. The magnitude of their business has made it necessary for them to still further increase their factory space and they have just finished an addition to their main building, which will give 20,000 cubic feet more room; they have also enlarged their office facilities so that they are now in better shape than ever to handle orders and can now build and ship at the rate of 60 Pianos and Organs per day, or 18,000 per annum.
