CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

ONTARIO.

Buying of lumber for fall requirements has not yet commenced to any extent. The local demand is rather quiet, but still sufficient to take care of all the stock that is offered. Harvesting operations are engaging the attention of the farmer, who, after his crops are housed, will enter the lumber market to a degree corresponding with the abundance of his crops. In some sections the crops have been damaged by rain, but on the whole an average yield is promised, and conditions from a consumer's point of view are satisfactory. The present prosperity of the lumber business is likely to continue for another year at least.

The chief activity is confined to clear lumber, shingles and lath. A scarcity of the best grades of pine has prevailed all season, and from time to time advances in price have been put into effect by the manufacturers. Retail dealers state that the frequent advances have been the cause of much dissatisfaction, as they felt that under the circumstances they were not in a position to quote prices to consumers excepting for immediate delivery. The higher prices have in a slight degree curtailed the demand for lumber for building purposes. Considering the season of the year, lath prices are firm. Most mills are asking from \$2.75 to \$3.00 for No. 1, although purchases are claimed to have been made recently at \$2.50. The wholesale price in Toronto is about \$3.50. Shingles are holding steady at \$3.25 for best grade wholesale in Toronto.

MANITIBA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

With an estimated crop of wheat of 60,000,000 bushels in Manitoba and the Territories this year, the business community takes a hopeful view of the situation. Lumber is being purchased freely for present and prospective requirements, and prices promise to further advance in the near future. The consumer or dealer who buys at current prices is likely to find himself on the right side of the market. British Columbia lumber is firm. Fir logs have recently advanced in price. Red cedar shingles are steady, in contrast to the weakness which prevails in Washington.

UNITED STATES.

With a slightly smaller volume of trade, the lumber market of the United States has maintained its strength. The past week has been quite eventful, several associations having taken action regarding price lists. According to the new
