harmony and friendfhip; that he had feveral times attempted his own lite, by frabbing himfelf; and once with a pair of feitlars in nine different parts of the hody, but without effect; he also attempted to throw himfelf over Blackfriar's Bridge. He had lucid intervals; and after he had committed the rath act on his wife, and endeavoured to deftrey himfelf, and from the lofs of blood became cool and collected, he enquired how she did, and said he had murdered his wife and mutt be hanged.

Mr. Maiditone, an attorney in Effex. firect, was by accident with others, in Mr. Loader's room, whom he requelted and gave directions to make his will, and left his niece the interest of one thousand pounds for life (if she so long should continue with his daughter by a former wise, who is deaf and dumb) he lest a clergyman and another gentleman at Plymouth, executors, and by will gave them two hundred pounds each for their trouble.

He had been at Church the day before, and was out the day he committed the act.—When he came home he feemed low and desponding, and wanted some broth, which he drank boiling hot as it came from the fire.

The keeper of the mad-house swore that Dr. Monro had declared he was a dangerous lunatic, and unfit for society, and therefore ought not to have his liberty; so that it is clear the wife's friendship and tenderness for her husband, was the fatal cause of her death.

The lopping off so considerable a portion of the Hereditary dominions from the House of Austria could not but be acceptable to more than one of the Germanick Princes, who already consider the Austrian family as much too powerful for the general safety and liberties of the Empire.
