“That it be resolved by the.....House of Commons,—That it is expedient that Parliament do approve of the Treaty for the Suppression of Smuggling Operations along the International Boundary between the Dominion of Canada and the United States, and Assisting in the Arrest and Prosecution of Persons Violating the Narcotic Laws of either Government and for Kindred Purposes, which was signed at Washington on the sixth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-four, and which was signed on behalf of His Majesty in respect of Canada by the Plenipotentiary therein named,” and requesting that Their Honours will unite with this House in the approval of the above mentioned Treaty.

“That it be resolved by the House of Commons,—That it is expedient that Parliament do approve of the Convention between His Majesty and the President of the United States of America for the purpose of enlarging the list of crimes on account of which extradition may be granted with regard to certain offences committed in the United States or in the Dominion of Canada under the Convention concluded between Great Britain and the United States on the 12th July, 1889, and the 13th December, 1900, and the 12th April, 1905, and the 15th May, 1922, which was signed at Washington on the eighth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, and which was signed on behalf of His Majesty in respect of Canada by the Plenipotentiary therein named,” and requesting that Their Honours will unite with this House in the approval of the above mentioned Convention,
