

WOULD ABOLISH ALL MIDWAYS FROM FAIRS IN ONTARIO

"The Gospel of Health Is No Fad," Says Medical Adviser to Dominion Commission of Conservation—No Man Has a Right to Limit Scope of Health Departments—Medical Supervision in Chaotic State—Child Mortality Increases.
