Inquest on Death of Harry Banks Adjourned a Week While Authorities Delve Deeper Into Disobedience of Instructions.

That the elevator in the C.P.R. building on which Harry Banks was killed last Saturday was being operted without even a passenger license and was being used as a freight elevator in face of an empaneled last night to investigate the death of David Stewart, who, at 2.45 a.m., June 28, was run over and killed by a yard engine in the Bathurst street yards south of the Harris Abattoir.

According to Nelson Smith, the engineer of the freight train on which Stewart was fireman, the dead man was one who could never stand heat, and on this particular night, while his should have before resching a should have before resc
