meant that in order to satisfy the demands of the public the employes were to do without the increase in wages to which they were entitled.

By Way of Bonus.

Harry Harper, the representative of men on the board of conciliation which met last year, stated in his minority report that "the employes convinced the board they were entitled to an increase by way of a bonus.

"The employes proved the cost of living to have increased since June. 1917, about 28 per cent. and the company admitted an increase of 15 per cent. The evidence does not bear out the company's statement that it is unable to meet increased charges unless given relief thru increased revenue, it being shown by the men that resident relief thru increased revenue, it being shown by the men that it has a surplus after paying dividends. If the same were not invested in subsidiary companies the company would have sufficient to meet the present need and pay increased wages to the amount demanded by the employes."
