HIS FOLLOWERS MORE LOYAL

SAYS CHAMBERLAIN

As a Party Badly Defeated, But Nearly Half the Electorate Supporting Unionist Policy, He Declares—Yesterday's Polling Another Liberal-Labor Triumph.

Birmingham, Jan. 16.—Chamberlain in his campaign address today, expressed his great regret at the defeat of Mr. Balfour. "In or out of parliament," he exclaimed, "Mr. Balfour is our leader. Now that he is out of parliament he is our leader more than ever. There is no man to whom we look with so much confidence to restore us to our old position, when the present delusions of the people have disappeared. We, his friends and followers, who have shown him loyalty in times of prosperity, will show greater loyalty now that he is for a period to go to that adversity."

He described Manchester as fickle and ungrateful, recalling its rejection of John Bright. Then he moralized on the Liberal victories, disowning any desire to minimize their importance. "We, as a party, have been badly defeated," he said, "but after all, when the election is over you will find that although in a minority, we have carried with us nearly half the electorate. The fact that things have gone against you should not lead you to further exertion. You must fight to the end. We are only half thru the contest, and the tendency which has exhibited itself, but we can send back to parliament a satisfactory band."

The Ebb Will Come.

"There is no tide that flows so high that it is not followed by an ebb. The reaction will come sooner than in previous times. I am confident that I have openly said I did not think this policy would be carried at any election. We were prepared to believe in this policy, to go on to elections, and if that is not enough we will go on to further exertion. If Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman thinks that by a scratch—a very large scratch—a majority, among Chinese labor, education, home rule and every other conceivable issue, the Liberal party can carry the day, I am not sure that we should always have our opportunity in regard to the policy."

Not Alone.

"After I am gone I think there will be plenty to follow in my footsteps. It is only one thing that is disturbing a little in the decision, that is the response made by the Conservative and Liberal parties. I am not sure that we should always have our opportunity in regard to the policy."

MAKE OF TORONTO THE "CITY BEAUTIFUL"

BY UNITED EFFORT TOWARD A DEFINITE IDEA

IMPORTANT CIVIC PROPOSITION LAUNCHED

Architects' Plans for Toronto's Improvement Heavily Endorsed by Leading Citizens—Get Legislation, Raise Funds and Do It Properly—Committee Named to Forward Scheme.

The annual banquet of the Ontario Association of Architects was given at the National Club last night. His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor was the guest of honor. Others present were Sir Henry Pellatt, Prof. Mayor, A. H. Campbell, G. A. Reid, R. McCullum, Fred Nicholas, Byron Walker, L.L.D., K. J. Dunstan.

After the toast to the King had been drunk, President Burke said that a year ago the association in convention had decided to forward the project of a comprehensive plan for the improvement of the city. This should be a difference between the officials of the city and the managers of other corporations. Corporations had a proprietary interest in the city, but the city had no such interest. It was the duty of the city to improve itself, and this should be a definite goal for the city.

There was a fluctuating condition of affairs in the city all the time. To procure an ideal plan more than anyone else, they have to know what was likely to be the situation in the future of every part of the undertaking. It was the attitude of managers of great corporations to lay out a plan, not for to-day, but for twenty years from now. This should be the attitude of the government and people of a growing city.

CONFERENCE IS OPENED

SPIRIT IS CONCILIATORY

Duke of Almodovar Appointed President—Contraband Arms First to Be Discussed.

Algeciras, Spain, Jan. 16.—The delegates to the Moroccan conference began assembling shortly before 5 o'clock this afternoon, causing a scene of great animation. The American delegation arrived at the town hall, following the Spanish, French, German and British delegations. The fact that the French and British delegations drove to the conference together was noticed and commented upon.

The conference was opened at 3 o'clock by the Duke of Almodovar, chief of the German mission, proposing the Duke of Almodovar as president of the conference, and the other countries represented, including the United States, seconded the proposal. The result that the duke was unanimously elected president.

During the course of his address, the Duke of Almodovar said:

"The powers have clearly shown their desire that order, peace, and prosperity shall reign throughout Morocco. The Sultan, as well as the foreign governments, desire this end, which is obtainable by introducing reforms upon the triple principle of the sovereignty of the Sultan, the integrity of his territory and equal commercial treatment, namely, the open door. Mutual respect for reciprocal interests and a sincere desire to conciliate must be, according to my view, the basis of this conference. Our own sentiment, as well as the expert attitude of the entire world, dictate such a conciliatory solution."

The conference adjourned at 3:35 p.m. until tomorrow, after deciding to begin the next session with discussing the surveillance of contraband arms, and then take up the question of financial reforms.

In order to give the secretaries an opportunity to prepare for their work the conference will however, not meet tomorrow.

When the Duke of Almodovar emphasized the necessity for the independence of Morocco and the open door, he was immediately and strongly seconded by the French and German delegates.

Free National Ports.

The commission which has been set up to make these ports free national ports, there should be no charges except duty on the goods or charges. Any property now owned by cities, towns or provinces, to enable them to be free ports, should be secured by the government.

In view of the government taking a survey of the Algerian ports, also of the Welland canal, no recommendation is made as to the deepening of the Welland as it is not proceeded with. The Welland should be to the same depth as the St. Lawrence.

The recommendations in regard to the Port Arthur harbor have been anticipated, and these recommendations are upon what the city is to do with the harbor, etc.

It is also recommended that the G. R. B. build a branch into Montreal. Robert Balfour is the original member of the commission who made the report.

To improve the harbor, the government will undertake the improvement of the Canadian ports on the upper lakes, and the larger type of grain carriers, drawing up to 10,000 tons, may be able to develop trade by the route between Port Arthur and Port William and Midland, and a new deep water port to be established by the Canadian Pacific at Victoria Harbor, near Midland.

Port Arthur and Port William will be made one harbor, and steps will be taken at once to extend the breakwater at Port Arthur for the protection of the shipping at that port, and to improve the lower reaches of both the Mission River and the Kamistiquia River at Port William. The Canadian Northern Railway has had their terminals at Port Arthur. The Canadian Pacific has erected its largest elevator at Port Arthur, and the Grand Trunk has terminals at Port Arthur. The Grand Trunk will also, and a new deep water port to be established by the Canadian Pacific at Victoria Harbor, near Midland.

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
