In Castle Memorial Hall on Monday evening, July 16, Rev. J. Redditt presiding. Addresses by Rev. John Griffith, Rev. Daniel Norman and Rev. Arthur Lee.

On Friday evening, July 20, the closing session, Rev. J. B. Silcox presiding. Addresses: "Sunday School Work in Many Lands," by W. C. Pearce, international teacher training secretary, Chicago, Ill., and "Japan and Her Future," by Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent of the Methodist Church.

Rev. Dr. Goucher will be a guest, with in the city of Chester, D. Mass., a close personal friend. The college of which he is president is a beneficiary under the will of the late H. A. Massey to the extent of \$50,000.

**HAMILTON HAPPENINGS.**

**ASKS NEW ARRANGEMENT**

**MILEAGE TOO BIG BURDEN**

**Cataract Power Company Wants Concessions, But Aldermen Are Frosty.**

Hamilton, July 5.—(Special.)—The special committee of the city council and the Cataract Power Company had a conference this evening. The company asked to be relieved of mileage which it now pays the city, amounting to about \$8000 a year, and repairs to the roadways.

When the aldermen declined to give these concessions, the company asked them to remove the mileage and charge a license fee of \$4000 a year. The aldermen could not see their way clear to do that, and all they would undertake to do was to relieve the company of the cost of repairs. For these concessions the company offered to build new tracks and buy new cars.

Col. J. M. Gibson, who appeared for the company, argued that the city would not lose anything by throwing off the mileage, because the company would extend its lines, and the earnings would be increased.

Mr. Stewart, chairman of the committee, told the company that the cars and the roadbeds were a disgrace to the city and he did not think the citizens would stand for them much longer. He also asked the company to say how much it would take for the railway.

Gibson said he would not set a price until the council had decided that it really wanted to buy the road.

**Against Parks Route.**  
The parks board this evening passed a resolution protesting against the parks route for the Hamilton, Waterloo and Grand Rapids and calling upon the Dominion railway commission and the Ontario railway and municipal board to refuse the company permission to build the road in the parks without the consent of the people.

The bylaw providing for the expropriation of J. H. Frazer's property on the mountain was passed. A sub-committee was named to report on a preliminary report of \$1200 per year at Dundurn Park. The contract for leveling the North End Park was awarded.

**Increased Salaries.**  
The internal management committee of the board of education this evening adopted the report of a special committee recommending generous increases in salaries for the public school principals and collegiate institute teachers, with a few amendments. According to the amended report, Miss Bennett, principal of the Picton-street school, and Miss White, principal of the Victoria-street school, will each get an increase of \$850 to \$900 a year, and Mrs. Davidson at the Collegiate Institute will get an increase of \$100. Out of 400 salaries received from the parents as to whether they wanted domestic science taught to their children, 320 answered in the affirmative. J. Jennings was appointed to the Collegiate Institute staff, to succeed Miss McArthur, at a salary of \$900 a year. It was agreed to engage a writing-master for the public schools. Principal Thompson of the Collegiate Institute was authorized to engage an assistant classical master at a salary of \$1000 a year.

John Lavery was put off a radical car this evening by a conductor and was badly bruised.

**Covered by a Cow.**  
William Bickle, Dundas, was fatally gored by a cow this evening. He was brought to St. Joseph's Hospital.

**Traveling Agent.**  
The Northern Navigation Company, has been appointed traffic manager of the Montreal & Lake Superior Line. He succeeds the late Andrew Cowan.

voted for the Lancaster amendment. Bourassa, Armand Laverne, Arch Campbell, Martin (Wellington), McIntyre (Perth), and Wright (Renfrew) voted for the rural municipalities.

Mr. Staples (Macdonald) moved an amendment conferring power upon the several provinces to expropriate existing telephone trunk line systems. Towards Public Ownership.

W. F. Maclean (South York) supported the amendment. It was long step the direction of government ownership. He quoted the remarkable success that had attended government ownership in Switzerland and other countries. Great Britain was nationalizing this great utility.

There was a growing movement towards government ownership in Ontario. The provincial government was about to furnish and distribute electrical power; why should not the people of Manitoba be allowed to pursue a similar policy in respect to the telephone business? If Manitoba succeeded, her example would be followed in every province in the Dominion. This proposal did not contemplate any policy of confiscation.

The government of Manitoba was prepared to pay the value of all property to be expropriated and to guarantee to the people of that province better service and lower prices.

**Appeals to Aylesworth.**  
Mr. Stockton opposed the amendment. He appealed for an opinion to the minister of justice.

Mr. Aylesworth, of course, opposed it. He did not regard public ownership as a practical question. It was something that might be done in the future. The Bell Company had been declared for the advantage of Canada. Why could not Manitoba start a system of her own?

W. F. Maclean intimated the minister that the belief in the principles of public ownership was growing with wonderful rapidity. Ontario and Quebec and the people of North York did not agree with Mr. Aylesworth in hoping that public ownership would never come. It was the only remedy for the trust abuses, and the corporation abuses that were the real crimes that menaced our society today.

Mr. Lancaster (Lincoln and Niagara) said that he was not frightened by the prospect of public ownership. It was difficult to see why, if the government furnished facilities for transmitting messages by mail, it could not do the same for messages to go by wire.

R. L. Borden submitted that both he and Mr. Aylesworth might live to see the advent of public ownership. He was not prepared to admit the constitutional difficulties suggested, altho it presented a difficult question. As to delegation of powers, had not the minister supported a plan for folding work and labor on the Lord's Day, yet made it subject to the will of every province? This parliament frequently conferred upon the minister powers which he could not confer similar powers upon the minister of public works for the attitude of the government in not more seriously discussing this important question.

Mr. Roche (Montreal) intimated the minister on this subject early in the session, but it had made no progress on account of the request of the government to change the rate of the amendment was lost.
