TURKISH GOVERNMENT BEHIND BLACKMAIL?

Evidence in New York Police Enquiry Into Armenian Secret Society.

NEW YORK, July 26.—The investigation of the Hunchakist Society, whose members, the police allege, are blackmailing rich Armenians, was pursued to-day, when Father Levont, an Armenian Apostolic priest, and treasurer of the society, appeared before the officials of the district attorney's office to tell of his connection with the society. Assistant District Attorney Manley, who is conducting the investigation, has in his possession many letters received by prominent Armenians telling of the exactions of the Hunchakists and the efforts they have made to extort money. Some of the letters, it is said, were not written in the name of the Hunchakists, but signed "revolutionary committee of terrorists."

Several well known Armenians have left the city, fearing to remain because of the threatening letters they have received since Mr. Tavahanjian was shot down in the street on Monday. Father Martoogian was given a rigid examination for over two hours by Assistant District Attorney Smyth. After the examination the Armenian priest made a statement in which he denied that he had any knowledge of the murder of the murderer of Tavahanjian. He declared that he was being constantly hounded and threatened with death in letters, which, he claimed, came from spies of the Turkish Government.

The priest said the present situation had been developed by the Turkish Government with a view of destroying all sympathy which America had had for the Armenians in the persecutions to which they have been subjected by the Turks. Father Martoogian said that he has been an American citizen for two years, and that the charges against him were instigated by the Turkish Government.

Assistant District Attorney Smyth said that the Armenian priest had been in the city for some time, and that he had severed his connection with that organization some time ago. The priest told Mr. Smyth that he was not conversant with the affairs of the Hunchakists.

JAPS ARE COMING IN.

Only 19 Out of 1200 Denied Admission at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, B.C., July 25.—Ottawa has declined to prevent the landing here of 1200 Japanese, including twenty-five women and children on the British tramp steamer Kumeric, which arrived yesterday. All but nineteen have passed the medical examination. Others will be permitted to land. All are from Honshu, where hotelkeepers' union in opposition to planters' association are engaged in shipping Japanese to this country.

They will continue to come until there is a law or head tax against them, says the agent in charge of the ship today. He denies that either the G.T.P. or C.P.R. are bringing them. He says they are drawn here by higher wages, and estimates that there are 75,000 Japanese in Hawaiian Islands.

Each Jap paid \$20 passage and made a deposit of \$25 with Hotelkeepers' Union Agent Chillingworth, a Honolulu senator, this amount being required before entering the Dominion.

NEW OIL DISTRICT.

Two Good Wells Are Struck in Essex County.

CHATHAM, July 26.—The beginning of a new oil area in the district hitherto unknown in oil production was heralded to-day, when authentic news was received that a 15-barrel-a-day well was struck in Tilbury West Township, and a 40-barrel well in Mersea, adjoining both in Essex County.

The records are according to official measurements.

ALL BELONG TO THE UNION.

Strike on Hoberlin's Building Was Short Lived Affair.

The carpenters and plasterers employed on Hoberlin's building on East Richmond-street went to work yesterday on the understanding that only union plumbers were employed on the job. A walking delegate called some day by informing the union men that the plumbers were not all "regulars," but the firm satisfied him on this point and all was peace again.
