The farmer is generally regarded as a very conservative business man. His ability to successfully fence over the expenditure of cents has become proverbial. McBRADY'S SALE GOES WELL

Little of Hard Times Reflected in the Purchases—Milch Cows Go High.

The sale of farm stock and implements of James McBrady, ex-rev. of Pickering, took place on Wednesday. As this is a peculiar fall, much interest was manifested by The World to see how farm stock was selling. In answer to The World's advertising, plenty of people from a distance and a good crowd of neighbors were present. The implements all sold well, and it is surprising to see where all accumulations of years go to when put under the hammer.

The horses were only an ordinary lot, and brought better prices than many "hard times" prognosticators would warrant. The highest price was \$150, for a two-year-old general purpose colt. Ordinary workers, 120 lbs., sold for \$150.

The high prices of the day were made in much cows. Young heifers about to freshen, and cows, sold around the \$50 mark. The young cattle were all grade short-horns, and brought prices that compare favorably with other years of cheaper feed. In fact, they sold better than at many sales in October of last year.

The hogs brought fair prices. Brood sows went for about \$20. Sheep, grade Cotswolds, sold low. They realized about \$15 per pair. While some ewe lambs beat these figures.

Cob corn sold at 50c per shock; hay, at \$17.25 per ton; mangolds, at 1c per bushel; turkeys, 1c a pound; ducks, 90c a pair, and hens brought 27c each.

Although the impressions of financial stringency and the depression of the market were not serious to the farmers of Ontario County. Bidding was lively at all times, and the really good animal sales well met. Thomas Poucher, an auctioneer of many years' standing, handled the sale.

ROADS CAN'T MOVE GRAIN MAKING NO CONTRACTS

Four Million Bushels at Buffalo Representing Capacity of 3000 Cars.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Following the recent protests of western grain shippers that it is impossible for them to get the trunk lines railroads to move consignments of grain from Buffalo to New York and that in refusing to enter into contracts for these export shipments, the railroads were greatly hindering the grain export trade, it is learned that the New York Central, the Lackawanna, and the Erie have temporarily discontinued the making of contracts on grain shipments.

The officers of the roads say that the cutting of contracts on future shipments was due to the purely physical condition of car shortage.

Francis LaBau, freight traffic manager of the New York Central, said: "We stopped making contracts on future shipments about ten days ago, and will not start up again until we are able to see our way clear out of the job of delivering the grain that we have at Buffalo already under contract. I imagine, however, that within a few weeks all the roads will be able to make new contracts."

We have at Buffalo at the present time some 4,000,000 bushels of grain representing the capacity of some 3,000 cars. It would be absolutely impossible for us to handle this grain at once and pile up more orders on our hands without sacrificing our interest in this grain and let our way to the suffer. We have to divide the thing up as equitably as possible."

The Lackawanna temporarily discontinued future contracts about the same time that the Central did, and a few days previously. It is believed that they will all be able to relieve the congestion in a few days and resume the acceptance of contracts.

LED, DOUBLE LIFE.

Boston Physician Succides Thru Fear of Exposure.

BOSTON, Oct. 31.—That fear of exposure of the dual life he was leading caused the suicide of Dr. Albert Cushman Day, of Brooklyn, N.Y., the staff physician of the Boston City Hospital, who shot himself in the woods at West Roxbury, Friday, two days after his clandestine marriage to Miss Estelle Maud Callahan of Edgewood, R.I., a trained nurse, was made certain by the discovery that the young doctor had left a wife who was about to bring proceedings against him upon the announcement of his recent marriage.

It was learned that Dr. Day was married on March 15, 1904, at Brockton, by a justice of the peace, to Miss Mary William A. Thompson of West Roxbury. The marriage was kept secret, as Dr. Day stated he wished to complete his medical course and hospital work before having his marriage made known to his family.

TERRITORY FOR MANITOBA.

Large Slice Will Be Added to Little Province.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 31.—S. J. Jackson, M. P. for Selkirk, to-day announced that the boundaries of Manitoba will be extended along the eastern border of Saskatchewan to the sixtieth parallel; southward to York Factory and Nelson River.

Under this extension, Manitoba will have 200,000 square miles added to her area.

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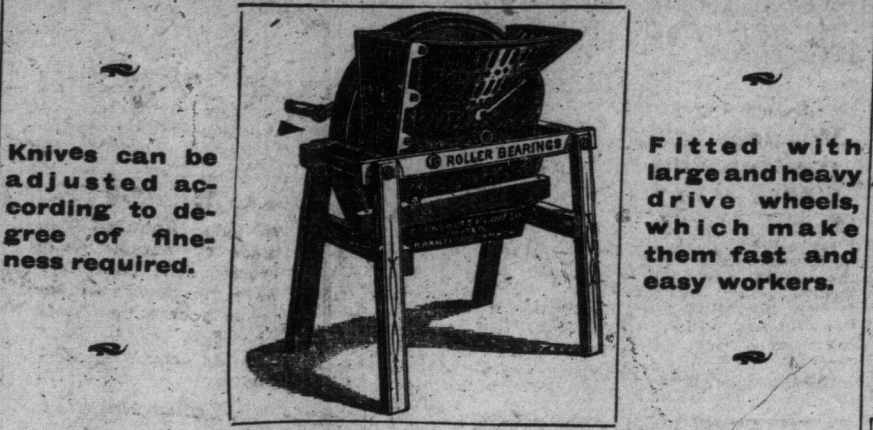

THE KARATAGH DISASTER.
Population of Place Did Not Exceed 5000.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 31.—No further information has been received there regarding the disaster at Karatagh, in the Province of Bakhmar, which was almost completely destroyed by a Oct. 21, resulting in the majority of the inhabitants losing their lives. A despatch from Tashkent to-day says that the total population did not exceed 5000, as a rule, the number of inhabitants was somewhat larger. In the summer, Karatagh is frequented by a large number of people of Bokhara the stricken town is situated, about 2500 feet above the level of the sea.
