



CAN CONSTABLES VOTE? | SIR CHARLES IN LONDON. Important Question to Be Submitted The Eminent Canadian Tells His to the Courts by the Lieut .-Ideas of the Warm Feeling Be-

Governor-in-Council.

The question whether or not constables have a right to vote at Provincial elections will come before the Court of Appeal. The Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council will submit this question for decision, and it is a very important one, in view of the small majority of the Hardy Government. Mr. St. John claims that 60 constables votel for Mr. Hill in the West York election, and in other protests the votes of constables are challenged. The statute provides:

"Any person who has been employed at the election, or in reference thereto, by a candidate or other person as counsel, agent, solicitor or clerk, or in any other capacity, or who has received, or expects to receive, any sum of money or fee, shall not be entitled to vote."

The Government asks if this refers to men appointed by the Crown, and not by the candidate, or appointed for the protection of the public.

"The McKinley and Dingley bills and the alien labor laws presented conclusive evidence on this point. I believe, however, that the present is a most propitious time for the settlement of all questions, and, in the changed temper of the American people, I think they can be approached with a fair prospect of a just settlement."
