London, Oct. 18.—It is reported that Senor Du Bosc, lately the secretary of the Spanish Legation at Washington, recently for warded a claim for \$100,000 damages against the Canadian Government for his expulsion from Canada on the charge of organizing a spy service in the United States after the war began. The claim was referred to Colonial Secretary Chamberlain, who declined to entertain it.

Though Du Bosc asserts that precedents exist for compensation being granted in such cases, he puts it forward as a personal matter and is not seeking the support of the Spanish Government in pressing it, the absolutely denies the accusation of organizing a spy service, and promises to publish all the facts in a short time.
