The crop year 1897-98 opened with an alarming deficiency in the wheat crop of Europe, and to such an extent that the world's requirements could not be met, unless the crops of Argentina, India and Australia and other southern countries should turn out well, which they fortunately did, enabling them to ship to Europe much-needed supplies. Even with the aid of these there would have been a disastrous scarcity but for the inflated prices in May, which swept the world of its reserves to a lower point than would otherwise have happened.

The wheat crop in Europe and North America promises to prove so largely above the average that the wants of all important countries can be supplied without assistance from Argentine, India and other southern countries. The consumption of foreign wheat in the Importing countries of Europe during 1897-98 was about 424,000,000 bushels. Making reserves. 98 was about 424,000,000 bushels. Making due allowance for exhaustion of reserves at harvest of 1898, but, in view of the very farge increase in European wheat crops of 1898 over 1897. The World estimated that shipments of about 360,000,000 bushels during 1898-99 would be ample for all requirements in Europe, and that the quantity could be supplied from North America, Russia and the Danubian principalities, leaving to all other exporting countries the

Five mouths of the current crop year have now transpired, and for the 21 weeks ending Dec. 24, the shipments from all exporting countries to all the importing countries of the world have amounted to 165,256,000 bushels, of which 154,592,000 bushels went to European countries, and 10,664,000 bushels to non-European countries. The shipments from North America, Russia and the Baikan Peninsula have amounted to 153,864,000 bushels, so that the result anticipated by The World has been realized, viz.: that the requirements of Europe have, so far, been covered by supplies from these sources alone.

Henry Clews' Views. great success in the peace negotiations, the manifest prosperity of the country at large, the prospect of a continued large expansion of our export trade, the extraordinary earnings of the railroads, the steadily rising trade balance owing to this country, the hopeful implications suggested by our coustantly tising bank clearings, and the comparative ease in the money market—these facts have for some time past been exerting a strong combined upward pressure apon securities, the effect of which is now seen in unusually high prices for the better class of stocks. Those securities, therefore, present little inducement for buying; on the contrary, some of the more venturesome bears are experimenting on selling them. Nor does it help the market that certain bold deals in industrial and rapid transit properties are being launched with advances in their stocks so startling as to suggest danger and distrust. There is how ever, a considerable range of second-class stocks, some verging towards a dividend paying position, and others expected to be benefited by impending new ulliances, which have not yet risen at all in proportion to the advance on the more stable stocks; these are receiving the special attention of buyers and seem likely to realize higher prices as the January investment terrings come to seek employment more fully.
