A Virtual Ultimatum.

London, Sept. 13.—A special despatch from Pretoria says the British note, which was read in both Raads yesterday (Tuesday), is regarded there as a virtual ultimatum. The correspondent says: "It proposes a five years' franchise, a quarter representation for the gold fields in the Volksraad, and equality for the British and Dutch in the Volksraad, and equality for the British and Dutch and new burghers in regard to Presidential and other elections. If these conditions are accepted, a conference between representatives of the two Governments snall follow for the purpose of darting the necessary measures, and of avoiding the introduction of unnecessary conditions by the Transvaal Government, or the possibility of the passage of any new billis calculated to defeat the reforms.
