Township Council Sanctions Request of Avenue-Road Residents for Annexation to City.

WOULD NOT OPPOSE "PROGRESS"

Toronto Junction Disorderlies Get Still Sentence—Serious Charge Against Newtonbrook Man.

The application from the city for the annexation of the Avenue-road district will come before the provincial secretary for consideration tomorrow.

At the regular meeting of York Township council it was decided to accede to the request of the residents for separation. Reeve Sylvester presided, and all the members were present. That the desire for a closer union with the city has taken a firm hold upon the residents was abundantly shown by the representative gathering present. Among those present and favorable to the union were John Macdonald, Major Gunther, J. B. Laidlaw, S. Wickson, R. F. Ellis, James Armstrong, Lawrence Baldwin and many others. In opposition were Senator J. K. Kerr and Allan Royce, representing William Mackenzie.

Senator Kerr declared that the desire for change was not widespread, that the matter had been unduly agitated and that many of those whose names were appended to the petition of the situation. He had secured city water, and other city conveniences, but it was at a great personal expenditure and the other members of the township could do likewise. Senator Kerr's declaration that Avenue-road residents could secure all the water they required from Lake Ontario, evoked laughter.

Frank Turner entered a strong protest against the proposed annexation, largely on the score of increased taxation. "We have thousands of acres of vacant land out there now," said he, "and we do not want city taxes."

Allan Royce declared the matter was of more local interest, that the present was merely an initial step in the dismemberment of York Township, and if allowed to go on no one could foresee the end. Fully a dozen of the residents were opposed to the union with the city, and the list of signatures was not reliable. On behalf of his silent Mr. Mackenzie, he warmly opposed the scheme.

Case for the Applicants. John Macdonald, representing those favorable to the union, and responsible for the signatures obtained, declared that the desire for the change, save for Senator Kerr and Mr. Mackenzie, was universal. No influence had been brought to bear to obtain signatures. The movement was the natural outgrowth of the city, and nothing could check the march of day in the city. The proposed boundaries were eminently fair, and city privileges as water, light and sewerage were a unit in endeavoring to obtain Lawrence Baldwin, James Armstrong, and S. Wickson urged the council on behalf of the residents to place no obstruction in their efforts to improve their condition.

On behalf of the members of the council John Wanless declared that he could not understand the attitude of Senator Kerr and Mr. Mackenzie. As a citizen of Brimley he wanted all the improvements he could command, and patriotic and not selfish motives ought to prompt the men of wealth. While regretting the loss to the township of the Avenue-road residents he would not stand in the way of progress.

Pass Sanctioning Resolution. Councillor George Syme was likewise favorably disposed toward the movement, as were Reeve Sylvester, and Messrs. Henry and Watson. John Wanless, seconded by Mr. Henry, moved a general resolution giving effect to the views enunciated, which was unanimously adopted, after which the denunciation withdrew.

By the proposed terms of annexation some \$200,000 will be transferred from the assessment of York Township to that of the city. The boundaries roughly estimated would project some 40 rods on each side of Avenue road, having as a southerly limit the present city division on the west, the line of the city on the east, the city limits, and the rear of St. Michael's Cemetery. The northern line or limit is projected some 30 ft. into U. C. College grounds.

Bracondale School Matter. The subject of the Bracondale Public School was yesterday brought to council in the issue of debentures for the sum of \$12,500 for a period of 20 years.

The board of health discussed the report of Inspector Michell, which revealed a laxity in sanitary matters among the residents of Deer Park, which council decided called for energetic measures, and steps will be taken at once to alter the existing state of affairs. The necessity for a system of sewerage, for that portion of the northern suburb, was still further impressed upon the members.

Toronto Junction. Toronto Junction, May 2.—Police Magistrate Ellis this morning dealt with two of the disorderly ones in Saturday's session. They were: Wyn Crews, well known to the police in Toronto, and John Smith, who was working on St. Michael's Hospital up to Saturday. Both were given sentences of six months in the Central Prison.

The town council held its regular meeting tonight. Sanitary Inspector Ward said that he took his orders from the medical health officer, who sometimes permitted the breadwinner to leave the house if the patient nurse was isolated. Ryding of the works committee submitted a report on the inspection of streets, and recommended council to take immediate action in many matters. Councillor Hain wanted to know if the fire limit bylaw was being lived up to, and what the street commission proposed doing in regard to Ball's lumber yard, which is in the middle of the street.

This question was not answered. Mr. Irwin cannot get back for a cult on Elizabeth-street, where the recent washout occurred, and asks to be relieved from his contract. He offers to have it done in six weeks. His tender is \$100 lower than the next one. Councillor Howell thought this too long for people to be kept from driving on the street, and the street commissioner will do the work at once.

James Haverson will oppose the applicant and Mr. DuVernet will represent the town. The bylaw did not properly pass its second reading, and in this connection the applicant's affidavit stating that on Nov. 17 last he, as a member of the council, in coming, protested that the bylaw was not in legal form, that no motion was made nor any motion put, voted on or carried to the end.
