WITH AN AXE
A Brooklyn Woman Accused of Butch-
ering Her Father.
New York, April 15.—Mrs. Dora Jef-
fries is locked up at the Liberty
avenue police station, Brooklyn, on sus-
picion of having killed her father with an
axe. It required the combined efforts
of four policemen to place her in the
patrol wagon and take her to the sta-
tion. She and her father, Thos. Han-
non, lived at No. 2,544 Atlantic ave-
nue, and it was there he was assault-
ed. He died at St. Mary's hospital
shortly after midnight. Mrs. Jeffries
was extremely nervous about the en-
tire matter. All that could be elicited
from her was that there had been no
one in their rooms all day except her-
self and her father, and that he must
have inflicted the injuries upon him-
self. She said also, in her excitement,
that her father must have fallen. Mrs.
Jeffries raved and fought at the station
house, and screamed hysterically that
she could not tell how her father had
been killed, if she were to be put in
to the electric chair for it. Mrs. Jef-
fries is 26 years old, and her father is
60 years.

CHANGED HIS MIND
Archbishop O'Connor Did It Once—He
Objects to Priests on Wheels.

It is worthy of mention that the new
archbishop of Toronto, the Right Rev.
Dennis O'Connor, D.D., is native born
to his archdiocese, having been born in
Pickering township on March 23, 1841.
His grace is therefore 53 years of age,
and is well known to be a strong man
in every sense of the word. Being a
Canadian, he possesses a thorough
knowledge of our social and political
condition, and his elevation to this
high office reminds me of something
that the late Archbishop Walsh fre-
quently said, viz., that the church
in Canada "could not rightly
prosper until she had native
priests, racy of the soil." It may be
said that rumor not only credits Arch-
bishop O'Connor with ripe scholarship,
but with also being a man of great
firmness of character.
Two little stories are being told that
are supposed to be characteristic. At a
dinner, which he gave in London not
long ago to some of the clergy of his
diocese, Bishop O'Connor declined po-
tatoes when the waiter brought them
around, having altered his mind. "I
am very glad to be present," remarked
one of the priests, "as this may prove
a memorable occasion." "How so?" in-
quired his lordship. "It may be writ-
ten down as the occasion when your
lordship changed your mind," replied
the priest. The other story has it that
the archbishop (then Bishop O'Connor)
visited St. Michael's College a month
ago, and standing beside the window
saw one of the priests ride by on a
bicycle, with clips on his trousers and
a slouch hat. "Who is that man?"
inquired the bishop. "That is Father
—," was the reply. "If I were his
bishop I should quickly inform him
that the must dress as becomes the
priesthood and put that wheel away." Bishop
O'Connor is reported to have
said. He is now Father —'s bishop,
and unless his grace is incorrectly re-
ported in this anecdote, there may be
several good wheels skirting the
