**WESTERN ONTARIO.**

The priests of Windsor made no reference to the Ontario elections in their Sunday sermons. Bishop O'Connor having forbidden it.

The remains of Mr. D. Little, of Kent Bridge, who died Thursday at the fire, were interred Saturday at Duart. Mrs. Little was a sister of Mrs. P. R. Campbell.

The building committee of St. John's Church, Tilsonburg, has been instructed to ask for tenders for the erection of the new church, the plans having been agreed upon.

Frederick Waskin, the old soldier, who was so terribly injured at the fire in his house on Young street, Hamilton, Friday morning, died as a result of his injuries the same evening.

John J. Carney, school trustee and license commissioner, Windsor, was opening a switch on the Michigan Central Saturday morning, when the lever flew back and cut open his forehead.

A fire broke out Saturday in an old frame building at the rear of W. B. Jennings' furniture emporium, at St. Thomas, used as a workshop and store. A considerable quantity of furniture was burned and damaged with water. Mr. Jennings estimates his loss at \$1,000.

Jim Gow, husband of "Little Lou" Bigelow, who, with his brother, Dan, gave George Richardson a beating Monday night, and then escaped to Detroit, was arrested there at the residence of his sister, and will be turned over to the Windsor authorities.

The Springfield municipal council has raised the liquor license from \$100 to \$140; a license of \$10 was placed on hotels, for selling, cigars, and soft drinks. The liquor license was raised in response to a petition presented to the council.

On Tuesday morning, Alfred W. Hammett, son of Mr. Richard Hammett, of Seaford, died, at the early age of 17 years and 19 months. He was a student at the collegiate institute, and was a general favorite with all. The deceased was the youngest of the Boys' Brigade, and they turned out in a body to pay the last tribute to their comrade, whom they loved so well, and who will be so greatly missed. The funeral was the largest that has been seen in Seaford for some time.

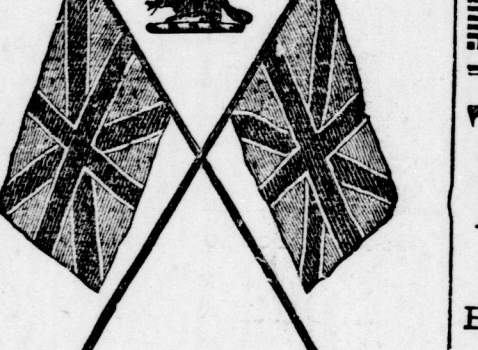
Probabilities—Lower Lakes—Fair; stationary or a little higher temperature.

**THE WHITE RIBBON QUEEN.**

The White Ribbon Queen was the title of an eloquent sermon by Rev. E. B. Lancelley in Dundas Street Center Methodist Church last night. The audience was very large, and packed the edifice to the doors. Miss Ziegler assisted the splendid choir, and the anthem, trio and quartet were very appropriate to the occasion. Rev. Mr. Lancelley took his text from II. Samuel, I, 21. The preacher paid a glowing tribute to the memory of the late Miss Frances Willard, who had been the greatest, temperance worker that ever lived, having done more for the cause than Neal Dow or John B. Gough. She was the best contribution of the Methodist Church to Christianity. She was too broad-minded a woman to confine her efforts to any one church. The preacher praised her for her efforts in behalf of woman suffrage, and spoke in the highest terms of her magnetic personality and eloquence.

**DEATH OF MR. GEORGE BIRMINGHAM.**

Mr. George Birmingham, who fell down an elevator shaft in Palmerston, and was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, died in that institution at 4:30 o'clock this morning. He was conscientious, of age, and was a very popular and amiable young man. He was a son of Mr. W. T. Birmingham, of 449 Oxford street, and was born and raised in London. He learned his trade, that of a carriage blacksmith, at the factory of Macdonald & Son, and was working in Palmerston when he received the injuries that caused his death. He was a member of the Orient Club, and one of the vocal quartet. The funeral will be held on Wednesday at 9:30 a.m. to St. Peter's Cathedral. Flannery, Mrs. John Dalton, Mrs. David Ibbot, and Mrs. Frank Orendorf, all of this city.
