A Conspiracy and a Farce

It is more manifest every day that Sir Robert Borden's sudden adoption of conscription was made with the deliberate purpose of putting Sir Wilfrid in a hole, and then by a false appeal to the patriotism of the people obtain an extension of power for another five years.

He and his followers had only one song as a justification for returning them to office—the need of immediate help for the 'boys at the front."

Now we have the minister of militia distinctly announcing at Dundas: "We don't intend to call up 100,000 men all at once and clean out the country, but in the first draft we hope to get probably 25,000." Frightened by the opposition in the farming districts he now promises exemption from military service to farmers' sons save in rare cases.

If, as he says, 100,000 men will not be called out at once and so "clean up the country," and only 25,000 are hoped for in the first draft, what a farce the whole thing becomes.

Canada has been set on edge under false pretences; the immediate relief of the men at the front is not the real issue.

The real issue is whether the Government is to get another lease of power controlled as it is by Sir Joseph Flavelle, still in office, by Sir Edward Kemp and Sir Thomas White, the representative in the Government of the Mackenzie & Mann interests. Nine-tenths of the Quebec constituencies are rural; this declaration of the minister of militia means that nine-tenths of that

Province are to be exempt from conscription. The Government's sole object is office. Frightened by the opposition found everywhere in the rural districts the minister of militia in order to secure votes, pledges himself to exempt the GREAT FLOW OF WHEAT farmer and not to "clean out the country."

Washington, Nov. 27.—Canadian wheat is pouring into the United States duty free through every customs district on the northern border in largely increasing volume, the department of commerce announced today.

For the nine months ended with last September, the United States imported from Canada 21,490,269 bushels, over 14,000,000 of which came in free after April 16. This was the date on which Canada removed its export duty, which came in fact that the content of the Cash barley was also in fair demand Prices were a fraction higher.
