LONDON CREEPS CLOSE TO THEM IN VICTORY LOAN

Less Than Half Million Separates Actual Total From Objective Now.

TRAVELERS' BIG BOOST

O. C. T. A. Takes \$25,000 Block in New War Loan Issue Today.

London's Victory Loan total went rocketing up Monday, when the team-workers turned in \$257,850, and called it a day's work. This boosted the city's total to \$4,500,150. The canvassers are out to make a grandstand finish, and are working hard to make London's share more than a bite or two. The county workers are beginning to hum round now that the snow is on the ground. Monday's result was \$100,000 over the county of Middlesex total of \$1,127,450.

Today the Ontario Commercial Travelers' Association brought the objective still nearer by taking out bonds to the extent of \$25,000. Of this amount \$25,000 was new money, the remainder being of former loans.

Victory Loan headquarters were elated over the latest subscription, and warmly praised the association for its patriotism. The amount subscribed surpassed in many instances the subscriptions of other travelers' associations throughout the Dominion.

SECT'S BELIEF INSUFFICIENT TO GET EXEMPTION

"Thou Shalt Not Kill" of International Bible Students Fails to Gain Immunity.

CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTOR

They Seem To Be Prominent as Ever in London So Far as Claims Concerned.

Notwithstanding the fact that up to date no conscientious objector to military service has been exempted by the tribunals sitting in London, the number of young men who apply for exemption on the conscientious clause has not decreased during the past week. John Lane, 523 Grey street, presented a letter to tribunal 189 enumerating his reasons for wishing immunity to the provisions of the military service act. He said that according to the Bible the Lord is at present sending up his kingdom and for this reason he did not feel disposed to fight because in his estimation he would be defiling his hands.

When the tribunal informed the applicant that he would require more plausible basis, he wished to be exempted. Mr. Lane said that he was under domestic obligations, and that he had developed that he claimed and his family had been members of the International Bible Students, and that the nomination there is a branch in the city. 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A Conspiracy and a Farce

It is more manifest every day that Sir Robert Borden's sudden adoption of conscription was made with the deliberate purpose of putting Sir Wilfrid in a hole, and then by a false appeal to the patriotism of the people obtain an extension of power for another five years.

He and his followers had only one song as a justification for returning them to office—the need of immediate help for the "boys at the front."

Now we have the minister of militia distinctly announcing at Dundas: "We don't intend to call up 100,000 men all at once and clean out the country, but in the first draft we hope to get probably 25,000." Frightened by the opposition in the farming districts he now promises exemption from military service to farmers' sons save in rare cases.

If, as he says, 100,000 men will not be called out at once and so "clean up the country," and only 25,000 are hoped for in the first draft, what a farce the whole thing becomes.

The real issue is whether the Government is to get another lease of power controlled as it is by Sir Joseph Flavelle, still in office, by Sir Edward Kemp and Sir Thomas White, the representative in the Government of the Mackenzie & Mann interests. Nine-tenths of the Quebec constituencies are rural; this declaration of the minister of militia means that nine-tenths of that Province are to be exempt from conscription.

The Government's sole object is office. Frightened by the opposition found everywhere in the rural districts the minister of militia in order to secure votes, pledges himself to exempt the farmer and not to "clean out the country."

The other day it was "the last man and the last dollar"; now it is "don't vote against us, farmer, we don't intend to take you, the 25,000 are to be taken from the cities and towns."

The Government are now promising exemption to farmers' sons solely because they are frightened of losing the rural constituencies. What confidence can be placed in any of their professions? Does anyone think that 100,000 can be taken from the cities and towns without "cleaning out the country"?
