

London, June 27.—When his proclamation calling for Irish volunteers was issued there was no idea of abandoning the possibility of conscription, Viscount French, lord lieutenant, declared in a speech on Wednesday at Belfast.

QUEBEC TO QUEEN CITY CHILD IS SMOTHERED

Ottawa, June 27.—The Province of Ontario is going headlong into insolvency, declared Senator W. C. Edwards this morning, during the course of a brief comment on a new timber limit tariff which the Quebec Government hag just put into effect. While admitting that himself and other large lumbermen would be seriously affected by the new tariff which has increased stumpage and ground rent rates as high as 100 per cent, Senator Edwards was complimentary of the Province of Quebec. "After all," he said, "the Province of Quebec is the only civilized province of the Dominion, because it is the only province that is solvent, and the only province that has a stable Government."

Headlong to Ruin. BOLSHEVIKI KILL EX-RUSS RULER

ALLIES FINISH MANY SUBS IN HUN SEA DRIVE

Sinkings for May Highest Since Ruthless Campaign Opened.

Loss, as Compared With Last Year, Shows Allies Winning.

London, June 27.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa agency)—The publication last Thursday of the admiralty's report announcing the merchant tonnage losses for the month due to enemy action marine risks totalled: British, 224,-735 tons; allied and neutral, 130,-939 toris, as compared with an adjusted aggregate for April of 311,-456 tons and 63),336 tons in May of last year. The losses from marine risk is stated to have been unduly heavy last month. The shipping ministry announces that steamships of and exceeding 500 gross tons entering and clearing in United Kingdom ports, exclusive of coasting and channel traffic, totalled 7,777,848 tons last month.

London, June 27.—The offensive by sea was still being maintained by the Germans during the month of May, with the utmost vigor. But in spite of the unprecedented fumber of subs sent to sea only 224,000 ton's of tonnage was lost, compared with 374,000 last year, says Archibald Hurd, distinguished naval authority, discussing the figures for May, just published.

"In spite of the fact that losses from marine risks were "unduly heavy," it can now be said definitely that the enoffensive simultaneous to attacks on the western front has failed definitely.

Along the western battle line, as well as on the mountain and Plave sectors of the allied front, the allied armies await further enemy efforts. Infantry activity is confined to local actions at various points.

It is believed that the German command is about ready to faunch another stroke against the allied lines. Paris, June 27.—A dispatch from Kiev, under date of Wednesday, June 26, declares that the report of the assassination of former Emperor Nicholas of Russia has been confirmed. It is declared he was killed by Bolsheviki troops during the retreat on

The Kiev message was received at Basel, Switzerland, and 224,000 TONNAGE LOST forwarded here by the Havas correspondent in that city.

TRIED AND SHOT.

Geneva, June 27.—The Ukraine Bureau at Lausanne announced today it had received confirmation of the report that the Bolshevik authorities at Yekaterinburg condemned Nicholas Romanoff, the former Russian emperor, to death after a short trial and then shot him. Details of the reported execution are lacking.

The first report of the assassination of Emperor Nicholas was received in Copenhagen through Stockholm on Tuesday, although it appears from rumors that the former emperor had been killed by the Bolsheviki, which had been circulating in Russia for some days previously. The Copenhagen message quoted the Russian newspaper Viia as saying that Russian Red Guards had murdered the ex-emperor in his residence at Yekaterinburg, where he was removed recently from Tobolsk.

An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Moscow dated June 21, and received in this country on Wednesday declared there was no foundation whatever for the rumors of the assassination, and dispatche from German sources last week reported that the former emperor was not at Yekaterinburg, having been removed to Moscow for safe keeping.
