325,000 RAILROADERS **VOTE FOR A STRIKE**

Walkout Favored Unless Demand for Wage Increase Is Met.

Detroit, Sept. 4 .- The strike referendum of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and shop leaders, completed Wednesday, shows that 325,000 members favor a walkout unless their demands for a wage increase of approximately \$1 a day per man are granted, brotherhood officials announced today.
