CHURCH UNION RESTS ON WHEN WAR END CAME

Presbyterian Assembly To Deal With Question Two Years After.

OTTAWA, June 8.—The question of church union between Presbyterians, Methodists, and Congregationalists brought out debate hinged on when the war ended. In a resolution passed by the 17th assembly the vexed question of church union was put over until two years after the war.

Rev. Hyslop Dixon, Alexandria, Man., maintained that the resolution should be presented to the 1921 assembly in such a manner that it could be definitely disposed of. He said that the west would not be satisfied with the recommendation presented at the Ottawa conference last night, which simply provided that the committee on church union be arranged.

Question of Principle.
A great question of principle was decided by the question of church union. It arose in connection with the \$5,000,000 collected for the forward movement in connection with the church. The objective of the movement in the financial drive was \$10,000,000. When the campaign was undertaken it was announced how the money would be spent.

But \$5,000,000 was subscribed and the question arose as to whether the extra million would be divided among the causes announced as participants in the four million dollar fund or whether the assembly had power to spend the extra million in good works according to the needs of the church.

Divided Pro Rata.
Yesterday afternoon the committee in question brought in a recommendation that the extra million would be divided amongst the causes provided for in the four million dollar drive in ratio to the amount these causes were already to receive. The decision was practically unanimous. Two of the institutions which hoped to participate in the benefits, in fact the question first came up in regard to these institutions—were the Ottawa Ladies' College to receive \$25,000 and the Westminster College of the West to the extent of \$75,000.

HOUSE SPENDS DAY UPON TWO TAXATION BILLS

Business Profits Tax Act Gets Its Third and Final Reading.

INCOME TAX MEASURE GOSSIP FAVORS LOWDEN
Latter Left in Committee—Objection to Hydro Exemption.

OTTAWA, June 8.—(By Canadian Press).—Two of the Government taxation bills were discussed at some length by the Commons today. They were the business profits tax act and the income tax act. The former, after criticism mainly contributed by Quebec members on the Opposition side, passed through committee and was given third reading. The latter was left in committee. Quebec members took the ground that the hydro-electric commission of Ontario should be subject to business profits tax, as was a discrimination against privately-owned companies to exempt it, they were especially so as it was giving the people light and power any cheaper than the privately-owned organizations.

On the other side the argument was advanced that provincial or municipal institutions were not making profits for private gain. Surpluses earned were returned to consumers.

Question of Exemption.
Sir Henry Drayton said it was not merely a question of exempting the hydro-electric, but also the municipal enterprises all over the Dominion. The hydro-electric was giving service at cost and not for profit.

J. B. Robb advocated doing away with the tax altogether, on the ground that it was an industry vital to the country. In connection with the income tax act, the minister of finance stated that provisions had been made for taxing incomes earned in Canada by nationals of other countries, notably of the United States. He felt that men who spent a part of the year in Canada should be taxed for the money they earned in this country. The taxation of investments made by citizens of the United Kingdom in Canada was being investigated by a royal commission.

Objection to Clause.
Objection was taken to the clause providing that persons shall send in the amount of their tax to the declaration of income. Jacques Bureau of Three Rivers thought this provision unfair. The Government should be responsible for billing the taxpayer.

On a comparatively short time the evening sitting served to dispose of the amendments to the bankruptcy act which would give force to legislation on the first of next month. The House then went into committee of estimates on the Indian affairs department.

WINDSOR, June 8.—Necessity for immediate establishment of a juvenile court in Windsor was brought forcibly to light today, following an investigation by Mayor Winter into the detaining, for over 24 hours of two small boys aged twelve and ten years, in quarters which the mayor declared unfit for human habitation. As a result of the discovery of these conditions, an order was issued that no children in the city should be confined in the special room hitherto used.

Cadets Inspected.
Brig.-Gen. H. Pring, G.O.C. No. 1 Military District, this afternoon inspected 200 members of the Collegiate Cadet Corps, who marched in review before him. He was attended by Lieut.-Col. D. A. McCrimmon.

Thirty applications for Canadian citizenship, the largest number on record in Essex County, were filed before the assize court which convened at Sandwich this afternoon. They are mostly Austrians, Germans and Hungarians. Six criminal cases are listed for hearing.

GREAT LAKES ROUTE TO SOLVE AMERICAN IMMIGRATION KNOT
St. Paul Banker Says Immigrants Should Reach Farm Lands.

SUPERIOR, Wis., June 8.—The Great Lakes tidewater route for ocean vessels permitting transatlantic passenger movement in connection with the Chicago and other lake ports will solve America's immigration problems was the declaration of E. P. Faust, a director of the Federal Farm Loan Bank of St. Paul before the international joint conference at the hearing here today.

"Immigration having centred in New York and eastern cities has been of little benefit in distributing the newcomers to the farms throughout the middle west, and the immigrants have not developed into America's best, because they are bunched into the crowded cities of the east."

CANADIAN PACIFIC OFFICIAL IS DEAD
VANCOUVER, B. C., June 8.—Richard Marpole, executive agent for the Canadian Pacific Railway, died today from heart trouble in his room at the Hotel Vancouver.

He was the first to propose a timetable on the twenty-four-hour system in America.

EMPTY CONTAINERS NOT SUBJECT TO TAX
OTTAWA, June 8.—Containers on which refund is made as returned empty are not subject to the sales tax of 1 per cent on transactions between wholesalers or manufacturers and retailers today by the department of inland revenue.

WORLD'S FORCES JOIN IN SMALL VICTORY

General's Supporters Won Two Most Important Chairmanships.

GOSSIP FAVORS LOWDEN
Less Than Half Delegates To Republican Convention Instructed.

CHICAGO, June 8.—The forces of Major-General Leonard Wood are jubilant tonight, although the trend of the talk among old party leaders is toward Governor Lowden of Illinois. The Wood men claim that they won a victory in the principal business transaction at the Republican National Convention today.

Instructed. Wood delegates won the two most important chairmanships, Senator Watson of Indiana for resolutions and Edward D. Duffield of New Jersey, for credentials. Frank H. Hitchcock has been designated supreme strategist of the Wood army.

But it was clear that the drift of the gossip favored Lowden tonight, old line party leaders who had taken part in former conventions, kept the Lowden name alive, but it was known to themselves alone whether this was intended to affect delegates who are opposed to Wood or Johnson or whether it was sincerely meant. With less than half the delegates instructed, the sponsors of Lowden advocate a rapid succession of ballots to produce a cracking of instructed support for Wood and Johnson.

It is not made clear why they profess not to fear a crack-down of Lowden supporters well known to the Wood men. One reason behind the willingness of the Lowden advocates to take all the risk in the election to efforts to get instructions is said to be that the supporters of Lowden would be satisfied with a representative from Wood and Johnson.
