DOES AN HOTEL LICENSE BELONG TO PROPERTY?

Proprietor of the Iroquois Believes He's Victim of Intended "Freeze Out."

George A. Graham, proprietor of the Iroquois Hotel, yesterday asked the license commissioners to regulate his license, should it be renewed, so that when at the end of the year his lease would expire he could get a transfer to another place. His reasons were that Mr. Palmer of the Palmer House would not release the property and the price he was asking for the site was prohibitive.

Mr. Palmer's solicitor argued that the license should stay with the place, as this was one of the understandings in the lease. Mr. Graham contended it was a scheme to either make him pay more than the stand was worth or to freeze him out. He didn't mind selling, but was not going to be frozen out.

The matter was allowed to stand over for two weeks, as was A. J. Horley's request that the owner of his hotel, 81 Yonge-street, be influenced to accept less than \$250 a month in leasing his property. The owner, T. A. Rowan, said he had spent \$25,000 in putting the property into its present shape and the price at which he was holding the lease was not too much, considering, in deferring decision the board suggested that the two seek arbitration.

Martin Wade wanted his shop license transferred from 522 West Adelaide to 1222 Yonge, and he was backed by a largely signed petition from people in the latter vicinity.

A deputation headed by Rev. J. W. Stewart, pastor of Yonge-street Methodist Church, protested against the transfer, and the matter was placed in the inspector's hands.

So far as can be learned from the inspectors who are making the rounds of hotels, all the houses west of Yonge-street are up to the statutory requirements.
