Bolting Baseball Leagues Ask for Eight Concessions

National Commission Will Give the Eastern League and American Association Audience Wednesday.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—The National Baseball Commission, 10-day met with representatives of the Eastern League and of the American Association and took under advisement several requests formally made by the two latter named organizations.

These requests, or concessions, if granted, are: 1. That the Eastern League and American Association claim, will serve for the betterment of the game. The formal request is to amend the National Constitution, to H. J. Killilea of Milwaukee, and as follows:

1. That the present national agreement be so amended or modified as to authorize and permit the American Association and Eastern League to draft players from all other leagues, except the National and American Leagues; provided, however, that said leagues can draft but one man from Class A major leagues, for the purpose of the draft and purchase rule of the national agreement be so amended that the players purchased and drafted from leagues below the American Association and Eastern League be first offered to the American Association and Eastern League at the original draft price before being returned to the league from which the player was drafted or purchased.

2. That the national agreement or rules of the commission be so amended as to limit the number of players any club of either major league shall have under contract for reservation at any time to 25, and to limit the number of players under reservation to 20 after May 15 of each year.

3. That the Eastern League and American Association be permitted to draft players from either minor league for a period of fifteen days, beginning at the expiration of the time fixed for drafting players by major leagues, for the following consideration: Class A, \$700; B, \$600; C, \$500; D, \$400.

4. That the national agreement be so amended as to permit the Eastern League and American Association to draft players from the minor leagues of the Eastern League Clubs in the same manner as said rule now applies to major league clubs with the further provision that no individual player can be sold more than once under an optional agreement.

5. After the paper had been read, Secretary Carroll of the National Association asked that he be given until Wednesday morning to reply, and this was granted.

McCaffrey, Toronto; J. C. Hickson, G. Boyer and M. Lichtenstein, Montreal.

The members of the American Association and the Eastern League held a meeting yesterday afternoon at the Victoria Hotel. A prominent figure in their deliberations was Henry Killilea, of Milwaukee, who, with his brother, Matthew Killilea, was so conspicuous in the organization of the American League. Killilea has been engaged by the American Association and the Eastern League to assist in the presentation of the petition of the minor leagues to the national commission.

Sincere Presidents
At a meeting the requests of the minor leagues were discussed and the program of procedure fully agreed upon. It was decided to appoint Messrs. Powers and O'Brien, presidents of the Eastern League and the American Association, to act with Mr. Killilea as a committee of three to wait upon the national commission.

The presidents and Mr. Killilea were very sincere in impressing the fact that the minor leagues which he is to represent are acting in perfect faith, without entertaining the slightest notion of a desire to acquire freedom from restraints which, until now, they have accepted as a matter of fact. It would appear that the American Association and the Eastern League are more eager to be reconciled to the pressure of the association of the minor leagues than they are to quarrel with the major leagues, who are owners of the American and Eastern Leagues, which are the two largest and most important leagues in the minor group, make no effort to disguise the idea that they are in the position of the dog being wagged by the tail.

MADISON SQUARE BIKE GRIND

One Rider Has Collar Bone Broken—Leading Teams Stay Together.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Smashing all hour records, except the fifth, 16 teams kept up a terrific race all night in the six-day international bicycle race, which began four minutes after midnight at Madison Square Garden this morning.

The racers eased up a little at the fifth hour and were five laps behind the record, but by continuous springing during the seventh hour they established the new figures of 163 miles 5 laps, which is 9 laps ahead of Eiker's and McFarland's record, made in 1906.

In a wild sprint, started before Moran, just before the end of the eighth hour and which continued for 27 minutes, the standing of the leaders was given a severe shake-up. Faber and Galvin, who only lost one lap each, ridden all the way, Brocco and Labrousse, who had lost one lap, and Down and Hollister, Wainwright and Root, Davonovich and Drobach and Galvin and Wiley lost one lap each during the sprint.

The leading teams at 2 o'clock had covered 45 miles 1 lap. The relative positions of the other teams was unchanged, with the exception of the Brocco-Labrousse combination, which had covered several miles to the rear. Their score was 20 miles 7 laps. The best previous record was 20 miles 7 laps, made by Eiker and McFarland in 1906.

At the end of the race, the support team was seriously injured, and a split late this afternoon. His collar bone was broken and he was forced to "rest" during the race. It is believed that his partner, Dupre-Georget, will continue and form a "back-up" team with one of the members of the French-Italian team.

Wainwright started up early to-night and was backed up unconditionally. He was speedily injured and it was at first thought his injuries were trivial. He continued to complete the race, but was ever and later to-night was taken to a hospital. It is feared that he is suffering from internal injuries of a serious nature and he is regarded as entirely out of the race.

The O.R.F.U. amendments, which came up before the annual meeting on Saturday, are as follows: Rule 1.—The entrance fee shall be \$2, and the annual subscription of each senior club shall be \$10, intermediate and junior \$5. No club shall be entitled to compete for the championship, to be represented at any meeting, or to have any of the privileges of the Union until all these dues and assessments have been paid. Fees shall be payable to the secretary-treasurer of the Union on or before Oct. 1 in each playing year.

Rule 7.—The annual meeting of the Union for the reports, election of officers and general business shall be held in the afternoon of the first Saturday in September, at such place as the executive may determine.

Rule 9, page 2.—Changing the date for the annual report from Nov. 30 to Sept. 1. To read: He shall prepare each year a detailed statement of receipts and expenditures of each year and present same at annual meeting.

Page 31, rule 12.—At the general meetings representatives from the majority of the clubs in the Union shall form a quorum, etc., instead of fifteen delegates at each meeting.

Rules and Regulations. The proposed amendments to the regulations and rules of competition in the O.R.F.U. are as follows: Rule 3, rule 2.—Reads: No player who has played with a club in the O.R.F.U. or Intercollegiate League in any previous year, except it be in a higher series, shall be eligible for admission to the Union provincial after Intercollegiate League.

Page 37, rule 15.—After the words, "except it be in a higher series," add: "Which shall be completed by a basis of 60 per mile per man, one way for eighteen men."
