

CRIST FROM THE ICEBERG

A Rival Ferry Company in the Field This Year.

SERVICE AT YORK STREET.

There Will Be No Mural Decorations on the Big Building.

Aldermen Think the Ferry Company Cannot Stand It Just Now—But the File Will Be Fitted Up With Pneumatic Clocks—Architect Lennox Tells of the Progress of the Work—Inspector Hunter's Claim Fulfilled.

The Toronto Ferry Company is to have a rival this year in the business of carrying people to and from the Island. The new concern is to be called the Island Ferry Company and will start with two boats, the Ada Alice and John Hanlan. The Property Committee yesterday decided to rent the small wharf at the foot of Lorne street to the new company, who expect to have their boats running by the end of the week.

The committee dealt with a large amount of other important business. It was decided that as many members of the committee as possible should visit and inspect the property on the Island recently acquired by the city and fix a sale price as high as possible. SALE OF MARKET STANDS. The City Treasurer reported to the Property Committee yesterday that the receipts from the sale of outside stands at St. Lawrence Market totaled \$119, made up as follows: Shelters \$388, poultry \$125, fish \$47.

CITY HALL NOTES. The Board of Control has authorized the City Engineer to purchase 100 tons of coal from the Standard Fuel Company at \$4.74 per ton.
